## SOW THISTLE MUST GO

Northwest School Will Cooperate In Planning Control Methods

Sow thistle eradication demonstrations will be carried on in several sections of the Valley this season by farmers cooperating with the Northwest Experiment Station, Crookston. The object of the campaign will be to encourage land owners to undertake eradication work, by demonstrating methods used by successful farmers, and by bringing directly to the farmer the results of investigations at the Crookston and other experiment stations.

Smother crops, such as millet, sweet clover, and buckwheat have failed to give satisfactory results in eradicating sow thistles, in the Northwest Station trials. Summer plowing at the time the plants begin to bud, followed by bare fallow the remainder of the season has given best results. Crop rotation systems which include alfalfa, sweet clover, and pasture crops have given satisfactory control without the use of summer fallow, if the fields are not badly infested before the system has been established.

Sow thistle seeds have seldom germinated and made plants the same season the seeds were produced, in trials conducted at the Crookston station. Seeds buried three to seven inches produced plants but these plants did not reach the blossoming stage the first season. However, at Fargo station, pieces of roots only one-fourth inch in length, when planted shallow, produced plants which blossomed within one hundred days. Roots forty-five inches in length were found less than two months after planting the seed pieces, and new plants had come up eighteen inches from the original root pieces, according to O. A. Stevens, botanist at the North Dakota Agricultural College.

Farmers are invited to write the Northwest Experiment Station regarding their experiences in sow thistle eradication. The station especially desires to get in touch with those who will carry on eradication practices this season. Bulletin on "The Sow Thistle Problem" will be sent to any address upon application.

## MANY VISITORS TO COME DURING SUMMER

Invitations were recently sent by Supt. C. G. Selvig to community and farmers clubs to visit the Northwest School this summer. Thirty-five organizations accepted the invitation last year and enjoyed the tour and visit. The visits are in reality one day short courses for men and women. They have been combinations of community get-togethers, picnics and school making an ideal combination. That the days have been worth while is shown by the large number of clubs that come annually and the fact that other experiment stations are beginning to follow the same plan.

If any community club has not received a personal invitation it was because of the fact that the Northwest School has not information regarding your organization. It is hoped that this item will supplement the letters mailed out and that all communities will consider themselves as invited.

The various groups are urged to set their date as soon as possible so as to have the better selection. It is

planned to have only one community visit at one time. The best dates are from June 15 until the first week in August. June 4, 18 and 25, July 9, 14 and July 19 are dates which have already been selected by various groups.

## NEW HEALTH SERVICE BUILDING

Superintendent C. G. Selvig returned recently from St. Paul where he conferred with the state architect regarding plans for the new health service building which will be built this summer. This building will cost approximately \$30,000 and will be begun as soon as plans have been completed and bids secured.

The building will be located on the site at present used for the tennis court northwest of the Home Economics building. It will be a three story building, fully equipped as student's health service quarters.

The space heretofore used as health service quarters in Stephens Hall will be available for dormitory rooms, thus increasing the school's capacity for twenty to thirty additional students.

## FALL TERM OPENS OCTOBER 4

The fall term at the Northwest School will begin October 4 and will close December 23. The second term will open January 3 and close March 24. There will only be two changes on the teaching staff. Mrs. DeEtte Genung will take Miss Rupert's place in the English department. Mrs. Genung was formerly Miss Cenfield who taught English at the Northwest School three years ago. During the past two years Mrs. Genung has been in the Philippines and will have many interesting experiences to relate to the students this fall. Mr. Milligan has accepted a position elsewhere. His successor will soon be selected.

A health service building will be erected during the summer and this will make the Northwest School a complete institution in every way. Minor changes are contemplated in the dormitories and Home Economics building which will add to the convenience and comfort of teachers and students.

The next immediate need will be additional dormitory facilities. The enrollment is increasing each year. The attendance for 1925-26 was 289 and it is expected that the enrollment for 1926-27 will be well over the 300 mark.

## Junior Short Course Well Attended

A total of 193 boys and girls from every county of Northwestern Minnesota attended the Junior Short course at the Northwest School the week of March 29-April 2. This was the fifteenth annual short course and was made up almost entirely of boys and girls who will be club members this year. The week was given over to class room work with a liberal amount of recreation, excursions, community singing and movies. During the week Miss Leonore Dunnigan of "The Farmer", St. Paul was present and gave instruction in newspaper reporting. The dates for the short course next year will be March 28-April 1.

## Homecoming Plans

Plans for the second annual summer reunion of alumni, students and friends of the Northwest School are well under way. The date will be June 25. A detailed announcement will be made in later issues of the Northwest Monthly but this is the time to mark it on the calendar so that nothing else will interfere with this date.

### Home Projects Have Strong Start

With 104 boys and 63 girls enrolled in home project work, the summer work of the school is well started and excellent results are expected. The community leadership project which has proved very successful during the

past two years is again the most popular project. Several of the twenty-two students enrolled in junior club leadership brought delegations from their clubs to attend the Polk County club day program at the school April 2. Twelve students are enrolled in the corn project, thirty in pure seed production, eleven in livestock projects, and eleven in farm accounting. Other agricultural projects selected are tractor and motor truck operation, building construction, potato production, bee keeping, and poultry.

Sixty-three girls are enrolled for a total of 320 projects. Dress making, canning, preserving, and baking are the most popular projects among the girls.

### SHORT COURSE FOR COW TESTERS

Eighteen men enrolled for the cow testers short course held the week of April 26 at the Northwest School. This course was held for the purpose of selecting men who will qualify to take charge of cow testing associations. Several associations in the Red River Valley have been organized and others will soon perfect an organization.

Prospective testers are given a thorough drilling in all of the work required for a testing association. Detailed work is given in figuring and keeping records, operation of the Babcock tester, and the figuring of rations for the dairy herd. Requests have been received from directors of testing associations that the best tester available be sent as soon as possible.

The interest in the movement for cow testing association and the fact that several such associations will function this summer in the Red River Valley, is a direct step in livestock development for this region.

The cow testing association results in the elimination of the "boarder" cow, better practices in dairy feeding, a more profitable dairy herd and a friendly spirit of community cooperation.

The first testing associations to be organized are at Fosston, Roseau and Moorhead. Other regions that will soon have a testing association are Rindahl, Detroit, Ada and Halstad. These associations will lead to interest for associations in other communities.

### New Creamery Dedicated

On April 8 Supt. C. G. Selvig and A. J. McGuire were present at the dedication of the new creamery at Greenbush erected by the Greenbush Cooperative Creamery Association. According to C. B. Goodrich, secretary the association has trebled its number of patrons and increased the receipts from \$14,894 in 1910 to \$110,390 in 1925. There are now 194 shareholders and 310 patrons which shows the increase of the dairy industry in that part of Roseau county.

### Don III AWOL

Don III the young buck deer at the Northwest School park is absent without official leave and from all indications does not care to face the official court called to convene upon his return. Don made his escape after a dog had entered the park and killed the mother Hazel Beauty Eyes. The disasters which have befallen the deer family the past year has reduced the number from four to one. Don I the graceful head of the family is the only survivor. Efforts are being made to add others to the park this summer and visitors will again be able to enjoy seeing the deer as they have in previous summers.

### Motor Classes Finish Work

The advanced motor class at the Northwest School have completely overhauled twenty-two automobiles and seven tractors, all excepting one auto belonging to the students or their parents as a part of their laboratory work. There were 204 valves ground and 150 bearings tightened. They installed 236 new piston rings, 44 new bearings, 21 new pistons, 64 new valves and 130 feet of new brake lining.

Every car and tractor was checked over regarding adjustment of valves, tuning of ignition, alignment of wheels, adjustment of clutch and brakes and was given a thorough examination of all bearings, bushings, gears and other parts of the car or tractor. Careful, accurate work was attempted rather than rapid work.

The farm motors laboratory has presented a very busy scene during the entire year.

## Demonstrations by Horticultural Dept.

Farmers from all over the valley are taking advantage of the offer made by the Northwest Station for the distribution of willow cuttings. Requests are still coming in and more than fifty farmers have been started with willows which should mean that five thousand willow trees should be of sufficient size for windbreak planting next year. The experiment station in distributing cuttings limited the number to each individual to 100 with the object not only of getting trees started but also to demonstrate how easily some of the fast growing trees can be propagated.

The campaign for farmstead beautification has met with splendid response. The fact that many of the native trees and shrubs can be used with pleasing results has been a revelation to many. Fifteen specific planting plans have been worked out this season, the grounds planned include city lots, farmsteads, school grounds and parks.

The pruning and top-grafting of tree fruits has been demonstrated in the orchards of Judge A. Grindelund, Warren and A. O. Solem, Halstad. It has been demonstrated at the Experiment Station that all of the hardy varieties of apples will succeed as top-grafts wherever crabs can be grown as stocks.

Comparative tests of small fruits chiefly strawberries and raspberries are being made with growers in the vicinity of Maple Lake near Mentor. The tests include fertilizer and variety trials.

Extensive work with fertilizers on potatoes is being done cooperatively in Polk and Clay counties, on a variety of soils including sandy loam, clay loam and peat. The chief objects sought are to find, first, the proper method of applying the fertilizer and second, the proper amount of fertilizer to apply.

The cooperative work with sugar

beets this season consists of fertilizer tests with phosphate and nitrogenous fertilizers and the tests of seed strains.

Two farmers are growing canning peas for seed in cooperation with the Experiment Station and incidentally demonstrating the commercial possibilities of the region for pea canneries. Fertilizer trials are being conducted on a variety of garden crops.

Considerable new planting of trees, shrubs and flowers is being done on the campus of the Northwest School this year. The main outlines of the landscape planting plan have been worked out during the past three seasons and the finishing touches such as filling in the shrub and tree clumps remain and most of this will be done this season.

The demonstration garden will have a finished appearance before the season is over with the pergolas, rose arches and arbors built and the bird bath and sundial permanently located.

The new greenhouse is functioning
