The cup for the winning team has been captured twice by the Northwest School, and twice by the North Central School, and twice by the North Central School.

The contest this year is under the direction of R. F. Crim and H. K. Wilson of University Farm, who will prepare all samples and judge the re-

sults.

In the Inter-School Livestock Judging contest, R. J. Christgau also reports entries from three states and Canada, thus giving an international touch to the activities of the week. Judges include C. Last year the silver trophy was won by the Northwest School livestock judging team, with George Wight as coach.

Farm club teams from a number of Northwestern Minnesota counties have been in training for some time so that an unusually keen contest is expected

this year.

High School agricultural teams from northern Minnesota and North Dakota have already entered the High School livestock judging section. Coaches are determined to dethrone the hitherto invincible Park Rapids team coached by A. C. O'Banion.



STAFF MEMBERS ATTEND UNIVERSITY FARM SHORT COURSE

Superintendent A. A. Dowell, T. M. McCall and H. A. Pflughoeft attended the Farmers' and Home Makers' Short course held at University Farm during the third week in January. Superin-tendent Dowell addressed the Central School of Agriculture student body at a special assembly, while Professor Mc-Call delivered a series of two addresses before the Horticultural section of the Short course.

Officials in charge reported a slight reduction in attendance compared to last year, but were gratified by the interest and enthusiasm that was evident throughout the week.

POULTRY TESTED BY STATE LIVESTOCK SANITARY BOARD

Under the direction of the Minnesota Livestock Sanitary Board and in co-operation with the newly formed Minnesota Poultry Improvement Board, of which W. K. Dyer is the executive secretary, the entire poultry flock at the Northwest Experiment Station, consisting of 835 birds, has been subjected to the agglutination test for the prevention and control of salmonelia pullorum infection, commonly known as bacillary white diarrhea.

The result of the test was indeed very gratifying as but two birds in the entire flock reacted to the test. According to A. M. Pilkey, who has been in charge of the Poultry division for the past ten years, the production records of the two reacting birds was very unsatisfactory and irregular. The first hen had produced only 211 eggs in the past fifteen months, while the second hen produced 401 eggs during the past 27 months. Twenty-three eggs from the latter were incubated during the past season with but four chicks hatching and three of these chicks dying be-fore they were three weeks old. The fore they were three weeks old. fourth chick developed into a mature cockerel and did not react to the test. Dr. Jenkins of the Livestock Sanitary Board, who performed the test, stated that seldom, if ever, are the reacting hens to this test of very great value as far as production is concerned.

The rapid whole blood agglutination test eliminates many objections to the slow tube method. The test can be made in one-half to two minutes, thus determining whether the bird is a positive or negative reactor. This eliminates the handling of the birds a second time to remove reactors from the flock, thus obtaining results of the test with less expense and time to the hatcherymen and flock owners.

The Livestock Sanitary Board is in control of infectious and communicable diseases among poultry in this state and cooperates fully with the work of the Minnesota Poultry Improvement Board, the work of which will be fully explained by its chief Mr. W. K. Dyer on Friday forenoon, February 12, of Winter Shows week.

STATION OFFERS PURE SEED

Yield per acre is of primary importance in this period of lew grain prices, according to R. S. Dunham, State Agronomist. Acre costs of production do not vary widely whether the crop yields well or little provided no extravagant methods are used to produce

high yields. The opportunity of making a fair return for land and labor, however, depends largely upon yields. Whether 4000 bushels of oats are produced on 100 acres or 40 acres may make a tremendous difference in the profit received.

Oats, moreover, is a crop difficult to produce at any profit under present prices. On some farms an increased vield of this crop may be obtained inexpensively by planting a better variety. In the varietal trials at the Northwest Station in 1930, Anthony oats yielded 31.2 bushels more per acre than the 20th Century oats. Anthony sold

for 60 cents a bushel and the 20th Century from \$5.00 to \$10.00 a bushel. In the same trials Anthony yielded 14.6 bushels more than Russian Green; 10.3 bushels more than Gopher; and 5.1 bushels more than Victory.

Anthony is a mid-season variety, with large kernels. The straw is about equal in length to that of Victory. It is highly resistant to stem rust but susceptible to smut for which it should be treated with formaldehyde or Cere-

The Northwest Station has a select lot of seed this year for sale at 60 cents a bushel. The seed weighs 38 lbs. per bushel, is 99.7 per cent pure, and germinates 98 per cent. A trace of wheat is the only admixture.
