Successful Farmers' Week

Visitors attending the Twenty-Third Annual Northwest School Farmers' Week and Red River Valley Winter Shows expressed amazement at the number and excellence of exhibits.

Entries in both the cattle and swine departments exceeded all previous shows. Sheep entries were nearly up to the all-time record established last year. Entries in farm crops and horticulture have been exceeded only three times in twenty-three years. With its 453 birds, the poultry show was one of the largest and best ever staged. Taking all departments of the shows as a whole, entries therefore exceeded any previous year.

Impressive Evening Meetings

Visitors were also impressed with the high quality of the day and evening meetings and were agreed that this year established a new record insofar as the quality of these meetings was concerned. High lights of the program included the address on "Technocracy and Unemployment" by Dr. George Mecklenburg, Minneapolis; the illustrated lecture "Birds of the Air" by Jack Miner, Canadian naturalist; "With Byrd at the Bottom of the World" by Dr. Laurence M. Gould, and the Northwestern Minnesota Singers' association annual song festival.

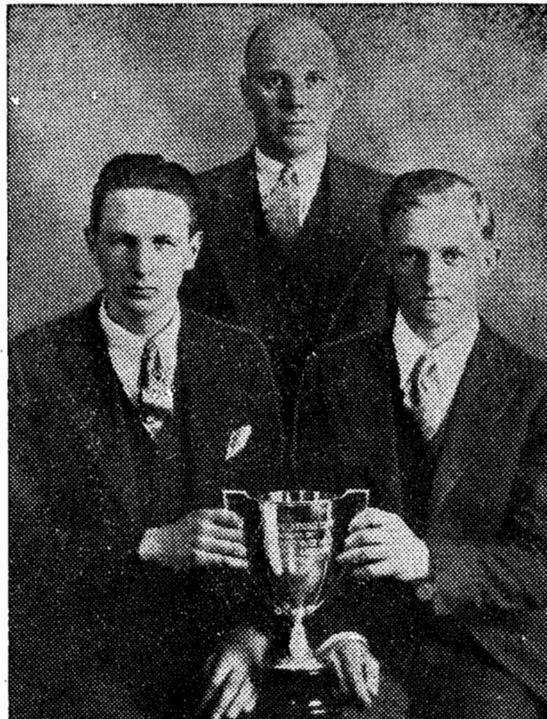

Though the Northwest School teams will be made up largely of new material, Mr. McGenty reports that the squads have been training industriously, and hence should make a creditable showing in the final contests. Mr. McGenty has not yet announced the positions on the conference teams, but is

expected to do so within the next two weeks.

BASKETBALL TEAM BIDS FOR CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP

After a series of non-conference games, the Northwest School basketball team tackles the Central School Aggies at St. Paul, February 21 and the West Central Aggies at Morris, March 3 and 4. The three contests are the only conference games for the season and complete the Northwest School schedule.

In the non-conference tilts, the Aggies scored victories over the Walsh County Agricultural school of Park River, North Dakota, and the Crookston High squad. Defeats have been suffered at the hands of the Bemidji Teachers College team, which administered two defeats; Thief River Falls

High school team, which also administered two defeats to the Aggies; and the Crookston High quint, which reversed the tables in the second tilt between the two schools. The St. Paul game, scheduled for February 21, is the third annual contest between the two schools. The Northwest School Aggies have been victorious in the games played during the past seasons.

Christgau's men last year decisively defeated the Morris aggregation in the first contest and eked out a one-point victory in the second game of the series. The Morris squad is prepared to avenge the two defeats suffered last year.

PURE SEED AVAILABLE FOR DISTRIBUTION

Pure seed of several improved varieties of wheat, oats, barley, flax, and corn will be available for distribution from the Northwest Station again this year, according to E. R. Clark, pure seed specialist. Fifty bushels of Crookston Strain Northwestern Dent will be available for growers who wish to establish foundation fields of this variety. Peatland barley, a stiff-strawed variety of the Manchuria type, will be offered for the first time this year. Peatland is resistant to barley scab and makes excellent yields on upland as well as on low land and peat. Velvet and Glabron, the smooth-awned varieties, also are available.

Growers who wish to get a start with pure Mindum durum, free from bread wheat and barley, may obtain pure stock from the Station again this year. Mindum is recommended by all State Experiment stations as the best adapted variety for the Red River Valley region.

Anthony oats, a large white variety, that has shown superior yielding ability and resistance to stem rust, will be distributed in limited quantities. This variety is a cross between White Russian and Victory, combining the size, shape, and excellent quality of the Victory with the rust resistance of the White Russian.

Two hundred bushels of Bison flax, the standard wilt-resistant variety, will be distributed. Copies of the annual seed list, with prices, and the Crops and Soils Handbook for the Red River Valley may be obtained upon request.

For the third consecutive year, Bennie Strickler, twenty-year-old club boy of Euclid, West Polk county, captured the 4-H calf showmanship honors. First place in pig showmanship went to Alvin Knudsen, Warren, Marshall county. The champion sheep showman was Donald Toomey, Thief River Falls, Pennington county. William Strickler, Euclid, West Polk county, won the beef calf fitting contest. Clearwater county 4-H judges nosed out the Wadena county team in the dairy judging contest held Thursday. Members of the team were John Hulteen, Harold Edgar, and Harold Berg, the latter being high individual judge of the contest. Wadena county placed second; Hubbard, third; Clay, fourth; East Polk, fifth, and Roseau, sixth.

In dairy team demonstrations Pennington county placed first, team members being Morris and Earl Engelstad, Thief River Falls; Clay county's team was second and Roseau's third. In individual demonstrations Roy Boman, Syre, Norman county, placed first in dairy, winning a trip to the Minnesota State Fair. Morris Engelstad, Thief
