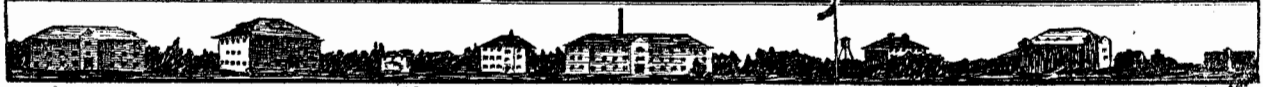

## Northwest School Wins Three Championships

### SUCCESSFUL SCHOOL YEAR

The school year which officially closed with the commencement exercises on March 29 was one of the most successful in years. A brief review of the year discloses the fact that health conditions at the school were the best in years. Only one case of a contagious disease occurred during the school year and the spread of this disease was averted by the prompt action of the school nurse in co-operation with the local and University health authorities. The health service however, was kept busy caring for bruises, sprains and many minor afflictions.

The school teams were successful in winning three of the five sub-collegiate championships; namely, football, livestock judging, and debating. The basketball and crops judging teams ranked second and fifth respectively in their contests.

The competition and rivalry between classes in the song contest, athletic and forensic contests was very keen. The competition in inter-class contests was very gratifying in that every member of the student body engaged in one or more of the events.

A high standard of scholarship was maintained throughout the year, which was made possible by the thorough application of the students to their course work and the maintenance of general good health.

### LETTERS AND TROPHIES GIVEN AT ASSEMBLY

The presentation of trophies and awards was the feature of the closing assembly for the year on March 24. The awards assembly officially marked the beginning of Commencement Week activities.

Acting Superintendent T. M. McCall announced that the Northwest School rated first among the agricultural schools this year in the sub-collegiate contests, having won first place in three

### Aggie Debaters Won Championship

The Northwest School debating teams were successful in winning both sides of argument with the Central and West Central Agricultural schools. The debates were closely contested at each school; the Northwest School team, however, won by 2 to 1 decisions in both contests.

Coach D. C. McGenty accompanied the team to St. Paul where they debated on March 9. The team returned to Crookston in time to hear the Morris debate on March 10.

The question for debate; namely, "Resolved: That the United States should adopt the essential features of the British system of radio operation and control," was one of popular interest and one of better balance than the question used in the contest one year ago.

Rose Naplin of Wylie, who debated for the first time this season, also graduated from the advanced course this year. Coach D. C. ### FRUIT AND GARDEN HANDBOOK PUBLISHED

McCall, horticulturist, has answered briefly and concisely the common questions arising on the growth and culture of fruit and vegetable crops. General directions are given in the handbook for the growing of tree, bush and small fruits, garden vegetables, potatoes, windbreaks, ornamental trees and shrubs. The bulletin contains lists of recommended varieties of the common crops. The Fruit and Garden Handbook is a companion volume to the Crops and Soils Handbook published by the Northwest School and Station in 1931. The bulletin will be sent free to those who apply for it.

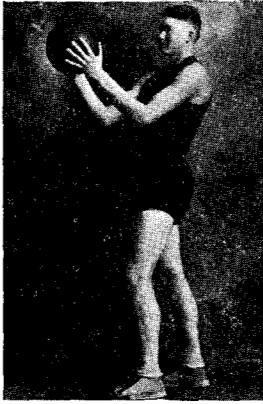

## Commencement Week

A busy and eventful commencement week was brought to a close Thursday, March 29, with the presentation of diplomas to 79 students. Fifteen of the number completed work in both the regular and advanced courses, making a total of 94 diplomas and certificates awarded this year. The list of graduates from the regular course now reaches 992 for the 26 graduating classes. The total graduates from the advanced course now amounts to 385.

### Baccalaureate Services

The churches of the community united in a union service with the Northwest School for the commencement sermon given the graduating classes of 1934. Reverend Elmer E. Johnson, rector of Christ's Episcopal church, delivered the sermon. Reverend Johnson's message on the subject, "Some Common Sense Thoughts on Living," was a challenge to the graduates to develop their lives symmetrically. Reverend Johnson traced the development of man from the savage, who knew only how to subsist, to the Christian era. He gave adequate proof that the development of the spiritual nature should accompany the vocational training if man is to make the most of life.
