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A. A. DOWELL ACCEPTS PROFESSORSHIP T. M. McCall Appointed Superintendent

On April 1, 1937, Dr. A. A. Dowell resigned his position as superintendent of the Northwest School and Station, to take a professorship in the Division of Agricultural Economics, University Farm, St. Paul.

Dr. Dowell has had a wide experience in teaching and research work. His teaching career began upon his graduation from Iowa State College in 1915. He served as instructor in Animal Husbandry at Iowa State College for two years before accepting the position as head of the Department of Animal Husbandry at the University of Alberta, Canada. While stationed in Canada, he was appointed to make a study of livestock markets in the British Isles. He joined the Agricultural Extension staff of the University of Minnesota in 1922 and was transferred to Crookston five years later. For ten months during the school year 1933-34, he was granted a leave of absence to direct special studies in livestock marketing for the Bureau of Agricultural Economics at Washington, D. C. Dr. Dowell collaborated with Dr. O. B. Jesness in the publication of

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SUCCESSFUL SCHOOL YEAR CLOSES

The twenty-ninth annual Commencement Week activities of the Northwest School of Agriculture were concluded on the evening of Thursday, March 25, at which time retiring Superintendent A. A. Dowell awarded 114 diplomas and certificates. This new group of graduates make a grand total of 1,680 since the establishment of the school in 1906.

The Commencement Week activities started with the Interclass Field Meet on Saturday, March 20. The Commencement Sermon was delivered on Sunday, March 21, by the Reverend Abner S. Haugen, pastor of the Federated Lutheran Church of Crookston.

Dr. and Mrs. A. A. Dowell were hosts to the graduating classes at the annual reception for seniors on Tuesday evening, March 23.

The concert recital by the Department of Music was held on Wednesday, March 24. The concert recital was under the direction of Miss Katherine Hennig, instructor in voice; Miss Marian Nelson, instructor in piano; and Miss Grace Warne, instructor in violin.

The Senior Class Exercises on Thursday were featured by a demonstration of "Weather Forecasting" by Warren Wardell, senior, of Crookston, speeches by class officers, and addresses to the class by the faculty advisers Miss Katherine Hennig and Mr. D. C. Streeter.

The Commencement Program followed the traditional march of the faculty and graduates.

Dr. O. J. Hagen, regional member of the University Board of Regents, brought greetings from the University. Raymond Higgin, Bronson, president of the senior class of 1937, in a stirring address to his classmates, accepted the challenge of the changing economic and social order and pledged anew the undying loyalty of the class to the ideals and traditions of the Northwest School. The Reverend Roy E. Olson, executive secretary of the National Lutheran Men's Council, Minneapolis, the commencement speaker, spoke on the subject "Youth at the Crossroads".

Honorary awards made by Dr. Dowell included: CALEB DORR PROGRESS SCHOLARSHIPS of \$17.00 each; Harlan Ellinger, Crookston, freshman boy;

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Professor T. M. McCall, horticulturist at the Northwest School and Station for the past twenty-five years, succeeded Dr. A. A. Dowell as superintendent on April first. Professor McCall joined the School and Station staff in 1911, one year after graduating from the Iowa State College. During the year 1929-30 he returned to the Iowa State College for graduate study following which he was granted the degree of Master of Science. During 1933-34 when Dr. Dowell was on leave to assist the Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., in studies relating to livestock marketing, Professor McCall served as acting superintendent.

The new superintendent has therefore devoted his entire active life to the work of the School and Station. All but thirty-three graduates have completed their work since he first joined the School and Station staff. He has given special attention to the production of potatoes, sugar beets, tree and bush fruits, and garden vegetables, in addition to his work with shade and ornamental trees, shrubs, and flowers. Under his direction, the campus beautification project has been developed to a point where the Northwest School campus is one of the most beautiful in the Northwest. He was field manager of the Station from 1919 to 1926 and has long been recognized as an authority on agricultural conditions in the Red River Valley. Under his leadership, the Northwest School and Station will move forward in its program of service to the farmer as well as young men and women of Northwestern Minnesota.

Superintendent and Mrs. McCall have three children, Donald, a senior at the University of Minnesota; Robert, a junior in high school; and Barbara, in the eighth grade.

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a book on "The American Farmer and the Export Market", in 1934. He is president of the Winter Shows Board of Managers, president of the Red River Valley Livestock Association, president of the Red River Valley Dairymen's Association, and past-president of the Red River Valley Development Association.

During the ten years Dr. Dowell has been in charge of the Northwest School and Station, student enrollment has increased one-third. Over fifty-seven per cent of the graduates have completed their course work during this period.

The physical plant and equipment of the School and Station buildings has been built up greatly during Dr. Dowell's administration. Recent additions to plant and equipment include the erection of a modern fireproof Physical Education Building in 1930; new auditorium and enlarged library in Kiehle building, 1930; development of a regulation football field, baseball diamond, track, tennis court, and skating rink, 1930-33; Robertson Hall remodeled, 1929; Stephens Hall remodeled, 1932; Home Economics remodeled and refurnished, 1933-34; all dormitory parlors and faculty quarters refurnished; the erection of a new sheep barn in 1932; bee supply house in 1934; the replacement of the station fences, and water mains to cottages and barns.

The best wishes of the faculty, students, and friends of the Northwest School are extended to Dr. Dowell in his new work and the Dowell family in their new home.

JUNIORS WIN FIELD MEET

Scoring 125 points as compared to 113 and 112 points for the Advanced and Seniors respectively, the Junior class captured first place in the 1937 field meet held Friday and Saturday, March 19 and 20. As indicated, the Advanced finished second, one point ahead of the third place Seniors; while the Freshmen trailed in fourth place with 89 points.

The annual field meet is the climax of the year's work in Physical Education classes and permits all students enrolled at the school to participate in the many events included in the meet. It also provides the final opportunity of the school year for interclass competition.

Alumni and former faculty members of the Northwest School will be shocked to learn of the death of Mrs. Matt Flensberg (Ruth Sheldon), former school nurse from 1925-27 and 1930-32. Mrs. Flensberg passed away at her home at Kanakanak, Alaska, on February 21, following a major operation.

Resigning her position at the Northwest School in 1932, Mrs. Flensberg took charge of the hospital at Eklutan, Alaska, from where she was later transferred to White Mountain. Two years ago she was again transferred, this time to Kanakanak and, after one year of service there, she was married to Mr. Matt Flensberg, a commercial pilot in Alaska. The marriage ceremony was performed at the

SCHOLASTIC AVERAGES

ANNOUNCED

A total of 116 students earned scholastic averages of 2.00 or higher during the winter quarter to gain places on the Honor Roll and High Scholarship lists. Forty students, including 28 boys and 12 girls gained places on the Honor Roll, while 75 other students, including 50 boys and 26 girls, earned High Scholarship averages. Final statistics show that 34 per cent of all the boys and 30 per cent of all the girls enrolled earned scholastic averages of 2.00 or higher. The Honor Roll includes twelve per cent of the boys and ten per cent of the girls.

To gain High Scholarship ranking, a student must earn an average of 2.00-3.0 in all subjects. An average of 2.5-3.0 entitles students to Honor Roll rating. The perfect average is 3.0 and students receiving "A" in all subjects gain the perfect 3.0 average.
