## SUCCESSFUL SCHOOL YEAR CLOSES

Commencement exercises at the Northwest School on March 24 concluded the most successful year in the school's history, according to Northwest School officials. Dean Malcolm M. Willey of the University of Minnesota in an address on the subject "Today's Education for Tomorrow," inspired his hearers to be open-minded and alert to find new paths to knowledge.

Greetings from the University Board of Regents were extended by Regent Martin Olson from Clitherall. Regent Olson stressed the value of the school of agriculture as a part of the University system and pointed out that the Minnesota schools of agriculture not only fitted young men and women to make a living but also to take their places in activities of their communities.

Wilson Radway, Roosevelt, president of the senior class, gave the class address. The musical program consisted of selections by the school orchestra and boys' glee club, a piano solo by Dorothy Evans of Middle River, and a vocal solo by Verne Dahlgren of Kennedy.

Diplomas and certificates of graduation were presented by Superintendent T. M. McCall to ninety-eight Seniors, forty Advanced, and ten special business training students.

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## SUMMER EVENTS ANNOUNCED

Summer activities planned for the Northwest School of Agriculture at Crookston as announced by Superintendent T. M. McCall include 4-H Club Week, Women's Camp, Alumni Reunion, and Young People's Conference.

4-H Club Week will be held from June 13 to June 18. Two three-day camps will be held to accommodate one thousand boys and girls from the fourteen Northwestern Minnesota counties. H. A. Pflughoeft, district leader of 4-H clubs, announces that an attractive program is being arranged for not only the boys and girls but for the junior and adult leaders as well.

J. W. Mlinar, Registrar, announced that the annual Women's Camp to be held June 20 to 23 will attract more than one-hundred and fifty women this year. A program of lectures, demonstrations, and handicraft of unusual interest to women is being arranged.

The Alumni Reunion date has been set for June 25. Class reunions, beginning with the 1908's for each succeeding five-year period including 1933, are being planned with the class officers as committees on attendance and program.

The annual Young People's Conference will convene on Monday, June 27, and continue until Sunday afternoon, July 3. The youth's bible conference, which is non-denominational, has attracted annually from fifty to seventy-five boys and girls for one week of study and recreation.

### SCHOLASTIC AVERAGES ANNOUNCED

Sixty students at the Northwest School earned Honor Roll scholastic averages during the winter quarter. An average of 2.5 to 3.0 in all subjects is required for gaining place on the Honor Roll. The list for the quarter includes 30 boys and 30 girls. The Seniors, placing 16 students on the Honor Roll, headed the classes but the Juniors, with 15, were a close second. The Advanced placed 13 and the Freshmen, 7.

Eighty-two students earned places on the High Scholarship list which requires an average of 2.0 to 2.4 points. Included in the list were 42 boys and 40 girls. The Seniors again headed the classes placing 30 students, and were followed by the Juniors and Freshmen who each placed 18. Six Advanced students and 10 Specials complete the High Scholarship list.

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### SENIORS PUBLISH EXCELLENT YEARBOOK

Distribution of the 1938 Aggie, Northwest School of Agriculture yearbook, was made to student and faculty subscribers Thursday, March 17, as a highlight of the observance of Senior Day at the school.

The yearbook, with a cover of royal blue, and a silver name plate, in keeping with the senior class colors, was acclaimed on the campus as one of the most beautiful annuals ever published at the school.

It is dedicated to R. S. Dunham, "out of deep admiration for a gentleman and scholar, a friendly counsellor, an accomplished musician, and a superior teacher who is the inspiration and envy of all his students," the forward says.

The Senior assembly program depicted various incidents of the school year. Byron Hess, Thief River Falls, was master of ceremonies and later introduced the editor-in-chief, Albert Adler, who made the dedication and presentation announcements. After the announcement of Mr. Dunham as dedicatee, Mr. W. J. Promersberger, Senior class adviser for two and one-half years and now connected with the North Dakota Agricultural College, was named as special dedicatee of the March of Time section. Opening pages of the 1938 Aggie are devoted to campus buildings and scenes, the second section to officials of the school and the University of Minnesota, of which it is a branch.

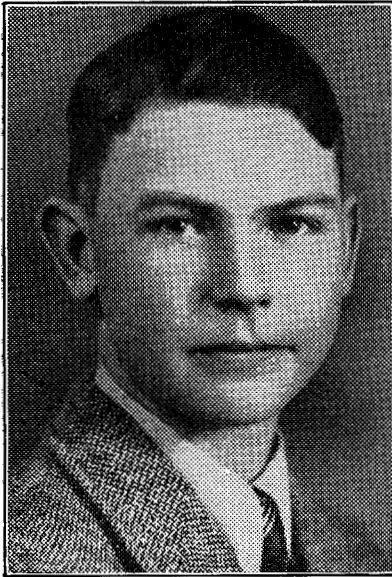
Senior class advisers, officers, and members are featured in the next section of the book, followed by the Advanced class, Special class, Juniors, and Freshmen.

A section entitled March of Time, features candid camera shots which tell the story of highlights of each passing month in the six months of the school year.

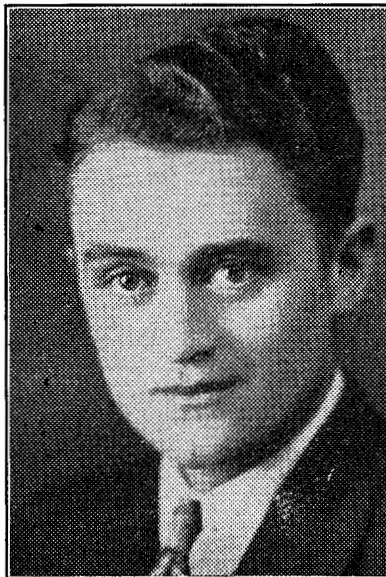
Activities, other than athletics, are described photographically in the next section, and sports occupy the following pages. Closing pages of the book are devoted to "added attractions" and the advertising section.

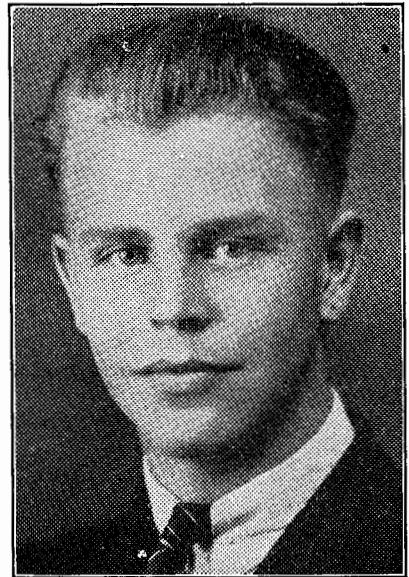

**SEARS-ROEBUCK SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS**

Five scholarships were awarded Freshmen boys at the Northwest School of Agriculture the past year from funds provided by the Sears-Roebuck and Company Foundation Scholarship project. The five appointees at the Northwest School are included in the thirty-one Minnesotans who are benefitting under the program. This Foundation scholarship project extended through seventeen states the past year and reached four-hundred and ten students.

The candidates at the Northwest School were selected by the Northwest School Faculty Scholarship Committee according to the following criterion: First, the candidates record of achievement in agriculture; second, the sincerity of his intention to continue in some full-time pursuit a career in agriculture; third, his scholastic record; and, fourth, his financial need.

The two scholarship appointees for

the fall term were Clifford Dahlsad of Georgetown, Clay county, and Roy V. Hanson of Detroit Lakes, Becker county. Clifford Dahlsad made excellent records in his 4-H club potato and corn projects in 1936 and 1937. One of six children, Clifford is the son of Martin Dahlsad. The Dahlsads operate a 560 acre farm located nine miles northeast of Georgetown. Clifford and his brother, Vernon, entered school together as freshmen last fall. Roy V. Hanson of Detroit Lakes made an excellent record in 4-H club activities. As a member of the Happy Hustler 4-H club for four years, he won two trips to the State Fair for his work in the dairy calf project and last fall won a trip to the Junior Livestock Show with his beef calf. Roy, the youngest winner of a Sears-Roebuck Scholarship is fourteen years of age and one of a family of four children. Mr. Arthur Hanson, Roy's father, operates a 250 acre farm ten miles north of Detroit Lakes.

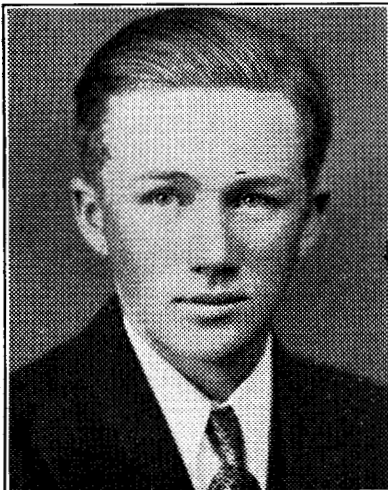

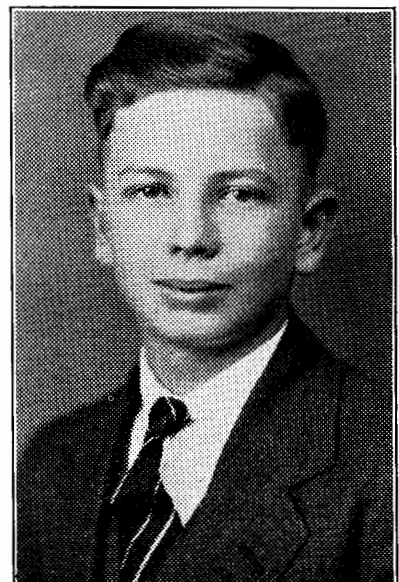
year. Edward's sister, Mildred, a former student, was unable to attend school this year because of illness during the fall term.
