# **Northwest School** Leads In Enrollment

The Northwest School again leads the Schools of Agriculture in fall en-rollment figures. The enrollment figures of October 10 for the schools of agriculture were as follows: Northwest School, Crookston, 411; West Central School, Morris, 323; Central School, University Farm, St. Paul, 295; North Central School, Grand Rapids, 65. The latest figures on enrollment for the Northwest School show 413 registered, with the state of the Alakstonian and the school show the state of the school show the sch with twenty-six additional  $\overline{\mathbf{for}}$ special swimming class. Registrations in the schools of agriculture this year are approximately seven per cent less than one year ago. Dormitories at the Northwest School are filled to capacity. It has been necessary to use the emergency ward in the Home Economics building and a few rooms in the Health Service building for girls. All girls, however, are given comfortable quarters even though the buildings are crowded. Students are submitting to the crowded condition in good spirit with the hopes that a new dormitory can be constructed soon.

An analysis of enrollment figures made by Registrar J. W. Mlinar shows a registration of 271 boys and 142 girls, with the following distribution by classes: freshmen, 93; juniors, 114; seniors, 111; advanced, 64; special, 31; and special swimming class for women, 26.

Each year there is an increasing number of out-of-state students attracted to the Northwest School. There are in attendance now two students from Manitoba, Canada, one from Montana, and three from North Dakota.

## **Doctors Give Students Health Examinations**

# Football Team Retains North Central Jug Trophy

One-half of the 1939 football season has been completed and the Northwest Aggies have compiled a record of one victory, one tie, and one defeat. Three additional games remain before the curtain is rung down in this major sport.

In the season's opener, the Aggies engaged the Crookston High Pirates in a night game at Highland Park at Crookston. It was the first experience in playing under the arcs for many members of the squad. Through four periods of play, the two teams battled with the Pirates threatening in the first half and the Aggies turning tables in the second half, but when the game ended the score was  $\theta$ -0. It was the second consecutive year that the two teams have battled to a scoreless tie.

The second game of the season found the Aggies tackling the Moorhead State Teachers College freshmen on the Northwest School gridiron on Saturday, October 14. The frosh from Moorhead not only outweighed the Aggies but showed greater experience. Although the final score was 12-0, statistics reveal that the frosh gained much greater yardage than the score indicated. In this second game of the season the Aggies showed great defensive possibilities.

Homecoming was observed on the Northwest School campus on Saturday, October 21, and a large crowd of graduates was present to see the Aggies crash through for their first victory of the season over their tradi-tional rivals, the maroon and gold team from the North Central School, Grand Rapids. In the middle of the first quarter, the Crookston Aggies began to click and scored their first touchdown after a sensational 55-yard run by the Northwest speed king, Harris Floan. From that point on the game proved to be mostly a Northwest School affair. Harris Floan, sensational Crookston halfback, scored three touchdowns on sensational end runs and Jack Ferrier scored two touchdowns, one being a 96-yard run on a kickoff. Ferrier also intercepted a Grand Rapids pass and ran 35 yards for a touchdown. The sixth Northwest School touchdown was scored by George Henre on a long forwas ward pass. The final score was 43-0 which represents six touchdowns, five points additional after touchdowns, and two points scored on a safety by Grand Rapids.

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## "Open House" At Owen Hall, November 4

There will be no formal opening of the enlarged and remodelled Owen building; however, "open house" will be observed on Parents' Day, November 4. The Agricultural Engineering Department will have five laboratories, two classrooms, and a mechanical drawing room open for inspection with all new apparatus in place. The three large commodious rooms used by the business training department for typewriting, shorthand, bookkeeping and advanced business training are now fully equipped for courses in business and will be open for inspection.

While considerable inconvenience was caused classes in agricultural engineering last year because of remodelling operations, the inconveniences are now forgotten in the pleasure of using the new facilities now available.

Owen Hall is now an imposing structure with the main entrance facing west, with stairway and service entrance on the east. The warm, well-lighted and equipped garage in the northwest section of the first floor is commodious enough to house the station cars, school bus, and farm truck. Work space is also available in the garage for servicing cars.

A large and well-equipped store room in the northwest corner of the first floor gives ample space for the storing of all necessary building supplies. A special fire hose room was also constructed on the north side of the building to house the fire hose cart.


# Miss Thorbeck Appointed Acting District 4-H Leader
