Open House Held In Owen Hall

Faculty members with classrooms and offices in the newly remodeled Owen Hall at the Northwest School held open house in the business training rooms on Monday, November 13, to members of the staff and campus families.

Classes have been held in the building since the opening of school and the building was open to the public on Parents' Day, November 4.

Members of the staff who were hosts at the "open house" included the Misses Fae Hughbanks and Ona Scheidler of the business training department, and A. M. Foker, Charles Snyder, and Raymond McVeety of the Department of Agricultural Engineering.

T. A. Hoverstad of St. Paul, first superintendent of the Northwest Experiment Station, was an out-of-town guest at the "open house".

Agricultural engineering laboratories occupy the first floor of the building with classrooms for business training and engineering and laboratory for carpentry on the second floor. Work rooms are also provided for Albert Mackowiak, general mechanic, and A. J. Anderson, bus driver.

The field machinery and gas engine laboratories on the ground floor are filled with late model farm machines, tractors, gas engines, airplane motors, and mounted automobile motors. The farm shop is fully equipped with tools and metal-topped tables for all kinds of farm shop work. The new down-draft forges can accommodate twenty-two students at one time.

On the second floor of the building are the typewriting and bookkeeping rooms which accommodate some thirty-five students each. They are well lighted and equipped to handle the continuous stream of students enrolling at

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Thanksgiving Day To Be Observed

Faculty and students at the Northwest School will join in the observance of Thanksgiving Day on Thursday, November 30. Thanksgiving, a one-day holiday at the school, will be observed in the traditional manner which makes the day stand out in the memory of students and faculty alike.

Committees from each student table will spend time before the dinner hour in decorating their respective tables to compete for prizes which are awarded during the dinner hour. One boy and one girl, the host and hostesses for each table, will attend the turkey carving demonstration staged annually by Professor A. M. Pilkey in preparation for carving and serving of the turkey at each table.

Fifty-two turkeys produced on the Northwest Station farm will be roasted for the more than four hundred students and faculty.

A program will be held in the auditorium during the afternoon and music will be provided by the school band, choir, orchestra, vocal and piano soloists. Members of the upper classes will read the Thanksgiving proclamation and speak on the Spirit of Thanksgiving and students of the Drama class will present a one-act play.

700 PARENTS GUESTS OF THE SCHOOL, NOVEMBER 4

More than seven hundred parents were guests of the Northwest School of Agriculture at the annual Parents' Day held on Saturday, November 4, at the Northwest School. More than four hundred parents visited classes during the morning, 466 parents were present as honor guests for the noonday dinner in the dining hall and others came for the afternoon program. An all-student program was staged in the auditorium with Superintendent T. M. McCall, presiding. Music for the program was provided by the school band, school orchestra, boys' and girls' glee clubs and girls' chorus.

Jack Ferrier, an Advanced student, from Pitt, Minnesota, gave the address of welcome. Donald Nelson of Kennedy was the announcer for the boys' home-project demonstration in which ten boys gave one-minute statements of work accomplished in the different types of projects. Miss Bette Haug, Oslo, and Esther McFarland, Oslo, Advanced students, announced the ninety-eight girls who modeled their dresses in the style revue. Seven students gave the one-act play "Goodnight, Please" under the direction of Edward Wegener, instructor in English. 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Football Season Closed

The 1939 football season at the Northwest School came to a close when the Crookston Aggies clashed with their traditional rivals, the West Central Aggies, as a feature of the Homecoming festivities on the Morris campus Saturday, November 11. The West Central team eked out a 13-12 victory to make their homecoming program a complete success. It was the first Morris victory in four years.

A summary of the season's record for the Northwest School shows that the gridders scored one victory, garnered one tie, and suffered four defeats. The season's single victory was gained over the Grand Rapids Aggies by a 43-0 score in the Homecoming activities on the Northwest campus Saturday, October 21.

Defeats were suffered in the games with Moorhead State Teachers College Freshmen (12-0), Concordia College Freshmen (19-7), Park River Aggies (37-14), and Morris Aggies (13-12). The tie game (0-0) was played with the Crookston Pirates in the season's opener for the Northwest School on October 6.

In the Park River game which was played November 3 at Park River, the Aggies were first to score after just two plays in the opening quarter. A Park River fumble on their own 22 yard line was recovered by the Crookston Aggies and in four plays the Northwest team led 7-0. From this point on the game proved to be mostly a Park River affair. The Walsh county Aggies scored five touchdowns before the Northwest team was able to score again and the last score for Crookston came in the closing minutes of the game when Harris Floan raced 85 yards for a touchdown. The final score was 37-14.

By virtue of their 13-12 victory at their own Homecoming program, the Morris Aggies took possession of "Ossie", the black and white wooden pig, which is the football trophy between the two schools. "Ossie" has been in possession of the Northwest School for eight of the eleven years of his existence. The Crookston-Morris game was hard fought throughout the four periods of play. On several occasions the Crookston Aggies were in scoring position but failed to register.

With the completion of the football season, daily practices have begun by candidates in basketball, swimming, and wrestling. It is expected that as soon as weather is favorable, hockey practice will begin.
