

Football Season Closes

A review of the Northwest School's 1940 football season shows a record of three victories and three defeats. Victories were gained over Crookston High (13-0); Grand Rapids Aggies (26-0); and Park River Aggies (58-0). De-feats were handed the Northwest Aggies by Concordia Frosh (6-0); Bemidji State Teachers, (27-0) and the Morris Aggies (14-6).

In Minnesota Ag School Conference games the Crookston Aggies finished in second place with one victory and one

The 1940 season opened on Saturday, October 5. The Northwest School eleven played excellent football in the season's opener to defeat the Crookston High Pirates 13-0.

In the second game of the season, the Northwest Aggies received some tough breaks which affected the team play for the remainder of the season. Besides losing a close game by a 6-0 score after having outplayed their opponents, the Concordia Frosh, through-out the entire game, the Aggies saw three of the four regular backfield men, Captain Lloyd Lund, halfback; fred Slettvedt, quarterback, and Martin Egeland, fullback, receiving injuries which kept them out of part or most of the remaining games on the schedule.

The season's schedule called for Moorhead State originally Frosh as opposition for the third game of the season but this contest was cancelled and the Frosh of Bemidji Teachers' were substituted. With three-fourths of the Aggie backfield being inexperienced men, the Northwest eleven was outclassed 27-0 by a heavier and more experienced team. But the contest provided the necessary experience to the Aggie backfield replacements to give them a chance to show their wares in the next two games of the season.

In the annual "jug" game with Grand Rapids the Crookston eleven triumphed 26-0 to retain possession of the football trophy between the two schools and to gain a victory in the Ag School Conference. The game was played at Grand Rapids. Northwest touchdowns were scored by Nybo, Loyd, Beucler and McMillan.

The fifth game of the season played on the Northwest campus against the Park River, N. D., Aggies was a complete rout. The Northwest eleven scored at will, garnering nine touch-downs and four field goals to pile up a The Northwest 58-0 score. Northwest touchdowns were scored as follows: Lund 2, Loyd 2, Beucler 2, Egeland, McMillan and Risbrudt 1.

The final game of the 1940 season was the feature event of the annual Homecoming celebration on the Northwest campus, Saturday, November 9. Despite very cold weather a surprisingly large number of alumni were on hand for the clash with the traditional rivals, the Morris Aggies. Seven Students Win Trips To Livestock Show

Seven students from the Northwest School won free trips to the Junior Livestock Show, held October 28-31 at South St. Paul, with 4-H club project animals. A special recognition assembly was held on November 27 for the winners of the free trips. McCall, superintendent, paid tribute to the boys who were blue ribbon winners in their county 4-H club contests. Mr. H. A. Pflughoeft, district 4-H club agent, gave a resume of the accomplishments of 4-H clubs in the Red River Valley in 1940 and conducted a panel discussion of club work with the winners of the trips to the Junior Livestock Show. Five lambs and two beef calves entered in the Show sold for a total of \$419.85. Clarence Sargent of Crookston, winning eighth place in the fat lamb class, sold his lamb for fifty cents per pound; Lyle Clow of Hallock won a gold watch for first place in showmanship in the lamb class and was able to sell his lamb for forty-five cents per pound. Howard Heitman, Ada, had the distinction of getting the largest amount from his project, \$136.50. Howard's Hereford beef calf, which weighed 1050 pounds, sold for thirteen cents per pound. Henry Hoff of Fergus Falls sold his beef calf for 13.75 cents per pound, but with a small calf, his gross return was \$95.00. From his fat lamb, Robert Anderson of Mahnomen received \$41.00; Roland Morrison of Fergus Falls received \$13.85 for his lamb; Vernon Hurd of Bagley sold his 250 pound pig at the sale for 14.6 cents per pound.

The boys concluded in their program that their time had been profitably spent in their 4-H club project and that much valuable information on livestock feeding and management had been gained.
