600 Parents Visit School

Parents' Day at the Northwest School on November first, was, according to statements made by parents and faculty, a great success. Parents began arriving at 8:30 a. m., and continued coming until program time at 2:00 p. m., with more than 600 in total attendance.

Parents visited their sons and daughters in the dormitories and attended the football game during the morning. The students gave up their places in the school dining hall to the parents for the noonday meal and ate box lunches which were served by the class advisers in the Hill Building.

Pictures were taken of Parents' Association officers and first and second generation students at 1:30 p. m. The Parents' Association met in the auditorium at 1:45 p. m., for their annual meeting which was followed by the student program at 2:15 p. m.

Superintendent T. M. McCall presided at the student program in the afternoon in which musical organizations such as the band, orchestra, choir, and boys' and girls' glee clubs took part. The style revue, in which ninety-two girls modeled dresses made in project work, was an outstanding feature of the program. Homecoming A Great Success

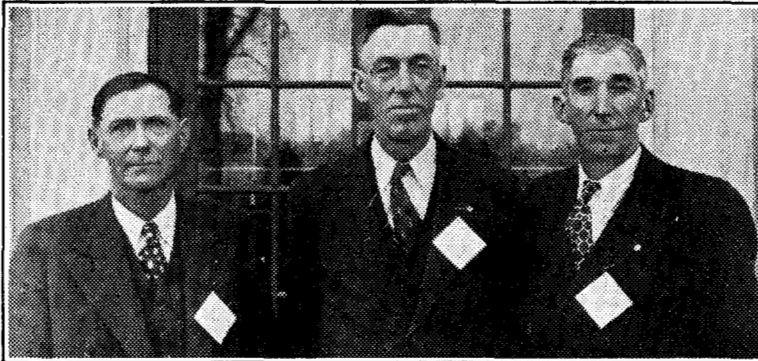

Transportation Aid for Northwest School Students

Many school districts are cooperating with the parents of Northwest School students in making the same tuition aid available to Agricultural School students as is being made to high school grade students who attend public schools. Due to a lack of information many school districts have failed to act on the matter of transportation aid and as a result many boys and girls who could attend the six-months school year at the Agricultural Schools cannot attend school for a lack of funds.

School district officers are finding that transportation aid for students attending state agricultural schools for their six months school year costs the school district only two-thirds as much as for the nine-months term. Members of school boards who attended the recent Parents' Day meeting at the Northwest School voiced the opinion that communities profited in other ways aside from the 33 per cent saving in transportation aid in that boys and girls at home during the months of April, May, and September added wealth to the community especially at this time of an acute labor shortage. Many school board members who attended the meeting on November first found out for the first time that the power to decide whether or not transportation would be granted rested entirely with the local school board. It was brought out in discussion that all but a few of the county superintendents of schools were thoroughly familiar with the new provisions of the transportation aid law as it applies to agricultural school students and those who understood the law were giving it their enthusiastic support.

Officers of the Parents' Association have been urging the parents to become familiar with the law so that students from their districts might derive the benefits of the law at the earliest possible moment.

The Northwest School will furnish parents, local or county school district officers certificates of attendance for all students who can qualify for aid.

227 Entries In Home Project Show

The Home Project show, a prominent feature of the Parents' Day exhibit at the Northwest School on Saturday, November 1, was a great success with a total of 227 entries in all classes. Judges and superintendents of the show were unanimous that the quality of exhibits in the boys' collection and the girls' sewing, baking, and canning projects was the best in years. Grain and potato projects were below standard in quality due to the wet weather which prevailed throughout the Red River Valley at harvest time. Students at the school, by carrying on summer project work at home during the summer months, earn extra school credits which compensates in part for the six-months school year.

In the girls' home project work, the freshmen girls confine their sewing to making cotton ensembles, baking of bread, cookies and butter cakes. The Junior girls in sewing make silk and wool dresses, do "make overs". In cooking the Junior girls do meal planning, baking of pies and cakes, and can fruits and vegetables. Senior girls make silk and wool dresses and various kinds of needlecraft.

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Track Championship Is Won By Northwest Aggies

The official cross-country contest for the Minnesota Ag schools was held at the Northwest School on October 25, as a feature between halves of the North Central-Northwest School Homecoming football game. Entered in the event were men from the Central School, St. Paul, the West Central School at Morris, in addition to the Northwest School boys. The course over which the contest was held was 2.4 miles in length, rather a severe test for boys of high school age, requiring excellent conditioning and thorough training in the technique of getting the most out of energy available.

Crossing the finish line first was Donald Hanson of the Northwest School team with the very good time of 13 minutes, 4 seconds. Central School men took second and third places, and from the Northwest Aggies Gene Johnston, Angus, took fourth; and Alton Knutson of Ashby, took fifth. Other placings of Northwest Aggies were: Lawrence Deschene, ninth, and Earl Krogstad of Fertile, tenth. Fifteen places, in all, were assigned. The total points gave the Northwest Aggies the best score by three points over the Central School with the West Central School coming in third. This being the official annual meet, the Northwest School was awarded the championship for 1941.

Invitational meets were held at St. Paul and Morris later in the season. The St. Paul meet was a combined college and high school event. The cross-country was won by a team from Macalester college. The Morris meet, a dual affair, was won by the Northwest School team.

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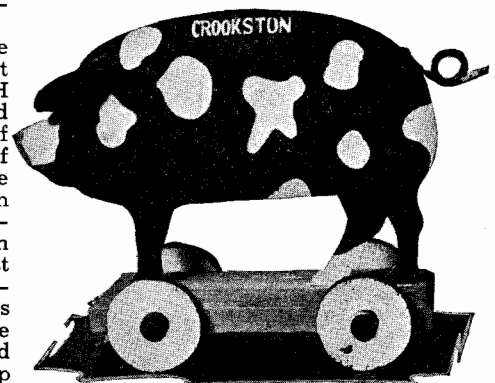

The Aggies played one of the best games against Bemidji, outplaying them the first half but unable to score. Score at half time was 0-0. Harlan Beucler was outstanding for the Aggies, making gains consistently, one of 40 yards. Clifford Nybo also performed well. The big blow to the Aggies came after the Bemidji game when Captain Clifford Nybo and lineman Herbert Johnson withdrew from school to take Defense jobs. Coming in the middle of the season immediate replacements were difficult to make satisfactorily.
