Exercises to Be Held at 2:00 P. M.

President Ford To Be Commencement Speaker

Dr. Guy Stanton Ford, president of the University of Minnesota, has accepted the invitation extended to him to give the Commencement address at the Northwest School of Agriculture on Thursday, March 27. In commenting on President Ford's acceptance, Superintendent T. M. McCall stated that the Red River Valley is highly honored in having President Ford give preference to the Northwest School in his last official visit to the Valley before his retirement on July first. The Commencement exercises at the Northwest School will be held at 2:00 p. m. in the school gymnasium, at which time one hundred and seventy students will be graduated from the regular, advanced and special courses.

The Commencement activities for the graduates began with the Junior-Senior banquet on March 8. Other events held to date include the Honor A banquet on March 12, Senior Class Play on March 14, and Senior Day on March 20. Two awards assemblies have been scheduled, the first to be held on Friday, March 21, which will be devoted to athletics and debate awards; the assembly on Monday, March 24, will be for awards in music, scholarship, and judging teams.

On Sunday afternoon, March 23, the annual reception for the senior class will be held at the home of Superintendent and Mrs. T. M. McCall. The Baccalaureate Sermon will be given on Sunday evening, March 23, by the Reverend Mr. Waldo E. Brown of Crookston.

The recital for the first and second year students in music will be held in the school auditorium at 4:00 p. m., on Monday, March 24. The recital for the more advanced students in music will be presented on Wednesday evening, March 26.

In order to accommodate the large number of parents, friends of the school, and students who desire to attend the exercises, the Commencement program will be held in the school gymnasium this year. A large section of the center of the gymnasium has been reserved for parents of the graduates. A public address system will be used during the exercises.

Juniors Win In Public Speaking

In summarizing the results from the six divisions of the public speaking contests held at the Northwest School during March, the Junior class ranked first followed in order by the Advanced, Senior, and Freshmen classes.

Interpretative reading contests replaced the formal declamatory contests in humorous and dramatic divisions this year. Contests were featured in the reading of both prose and poetry in the two divisions. Orators, this year for the first time, competed with orations which were their original compositions. Disastrous Storm Strikes Valley

A blizzard of tornado proportions struck the Crookston area of the Red River Valley on Saturday, March 15, at approximately 9:25 p. m. The suddenness and ferocity of the storm caught hundreds of motorists along highways and caused a total toll of more than seventy persons.

Tragedy struck close by the Northwest School where there was a death toll of seven persons within a radius of just a few miles. Many of the campus residents were marooned in Crookston and two faculty members had to spend the night in a car less than one-fourth of a mile from the campus gate.

Fortunately for the Northwest School students, the lyceum speaker on Saturday evening, Stanley Osborn of Australia, did not finish his lecture in the auditorium until after the storm struck the community; as a result some fifteen students from Crookston were kept in the dormitories until Sunday afternoon. Seven people who abandoned cars within a quarter mile of the School reached Robertson Hall about 3:00 a. m. and remained until after the storm abated. Three people from Grand Forks, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Ellington and Miss Harriet Coger, who abandoned their car quite near a farm house about one mile west of the School, became lost and perished in the center of the north field of the west school farm. The Misses Martha Manning and Marian Frykman, members of the Northwest School staff, were caught in the storm just north of the railroad crossing on the main highway. The motor of Miss Manning's car stopped about 10:30 p. m. With no robes except newspapers and only medium weight winter coats, the girls carried on a systematic program of exercises to keep from freezing and remain awake. They were rescued about 8:00 a. m. on Sunday and miraculously escaped without frostbite.

Mountainous drifts piled high by the seventy-mile an hour wind filled the campus roadways and tied up traffic until late Sunday afternoon.

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James Weckwerth, '36, Dies

While full details of the tragedy are lacking, it has been learned that James perished while trying to reach a younger brother reported lost in the storm.

James will be remembered as an outstanding student who won many honors in scholarship, public speaking, and debate. Professor and Mrs. R. J. Christgau, Mr. and Mrs. Llewellyn Reese, and Hilbert Thompson represented the Northwest School at the funeral held in Thief River Falls on March 20.

The sympathy of the School and all who knew James is extended to the Weckwerth family.

Central School Wins Triangular Debate

A triangular debate held between the Central, West Central, and Northwest Schools of Agriculture was won by the Central School, University Farm, St. Paul, this year. The Central School debating team won by a two to one decision over the Northwest School at Crookston and West Central School, Morris, at St. Paul. The Northwest School negative team lost at Morris by a two to one decision. The question for debate this year was "Resolved: that the power of the federal government be increased."

Excellent progress has been made in debate at the Northwest School this year under the direction of Miss DeLores Webster, debate coach. A goodly number of debaters received practice in the non-decision debates with high schools in this district and prospects for the 1942 debate work are unusually bright. Karilton Rosholt, of Pelican Rapids, and Margaret Ristad, Hallock, represented the Northwest School at the debate at Morris. Donald Nelson, Kennedy, and Verner Nelson of Euclid, upheld the negative side of the argument at Crookston. Dayton Jacobson, Pelican Rapids, the first alternate, accompanied the team to Morris.

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Athletes Win One Conference Championship

Athletic activities at the Northwest School came to an end for the 1940-1941 year on March 3 with the hockey game between the Aggies and Crookston Cathedral high school. Only the annual inter-class field meet remains on the athletic schedule for the year.

The Northwest School swimming team captured for the third straight year the championship in swimming events in the annual Minnesota Ag School Conference meet held this year at Morris. The Northwest Aggies scored 33 points, 13 more than the second place St. Paul team who had a total of 26 points, while Morris in third place garnered 13 points. Grand Rapids was not entered in the swimming events. Captain David Brown, Fergus Falls, was the star of the swimming events, capturing first place in the 100 yard free-style event and first place in the 40 yard free-style. He teamed up with other squad members to win the 160 yard free-style relay. Upon their return to the campus, the swimming squad brought back the championship trophy for permanent possession of the Northwest School. The official presentation was made at assembly by Captain Brown with Superintendent T. M. McCall accepting it for the school.

In wrestling, the Northwest Aggies finished in third place with 15 points. St. Paul walked off with the wrestling championship with 42 points. It was the third straight year in which St. Paul won top honors in the Conference. Grand Rapids finished second with 23 points. The Northwest Aggies took second place in the following classes: 121 pounds, 175 pounds and heavy-weight championship. In the other weights they finished third.

The basketball season came to an end on February 28 when the Aggies earned a 33-31 victory over Sacred Heart High of East Grand Forks. The Aggies had lost the three preceding games by one point in games that were thrillers and the final victory over Sacred Heart brought a happy ending to the season. A total of 19 games were played by the Aggies showing a record of 6 victories and 13 defeats.

Hockey was the last inter-school athletic event of the year and the season came to a close on March 3 with the Northwest Aggies upsetting the dope by earning a 2 to 1 victory over Crookston Cathedral high school. The two
