Winter Shows A Great Success

The 32nd annual Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week, which was held February 2-6, was a success in every department. Mild weather contributed to the comfort of all who attended the various meetings and shows.

The total attendance at both shows and meetings was slightly under the record attendance of the 1941 shows. Thursday, February 5, cattle sale day, established a record attendance of 2,174 persons, the largest single attendance at the shows in more than twenty years.

More than \$1,500 worth of improvements were made by the Livestock Association this year in remodelling the swine barn for the poultry show and the old poultry room for food and feed concessions. This added greatly to the general effectiveness of the shows as a whole.

Starting with the judging contests on Monday, February 2, in which some two hundred contestants from three states competed for honors in crops and livestock judging until the closing lecture by Sir Charles Morgan-Webb of London, on Friday evening, February 6, each day's program was filled with items of interest to crops, livestock, poultry, and crops men, women, and 4-H boys and girls.

One outstanding event of the week was the Red River Valley pageant "Pan-Americana" which was presented by a cast of 340 men and women from the fourteen Northwestern Minnesota counties. This project was sponsored jointly by the Winter Shows Board of Managers, county agents, and special committees from each of the Valley counties.

Each evening program was featured by an authority in his field, President W. C. Coffey of the University of Minnesota in education; Canfield Cook of Chicago, aviation; and Sir Charles Morgan-Webb of London, England, in international relations.

Aside from the special daily programs for men, women, and 4-H club members, the two livestock sales highlighted the days' programs.

The Board of Managers of the Red River Valley Winter Shows, at their business meeting on February 6 of Winter Shows week, decided upon the dates of February 1 through 5, inclusive, for the 1943 Red River Valley Winter Shows to be held at Crookston.

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Commencement To Be Held March 26

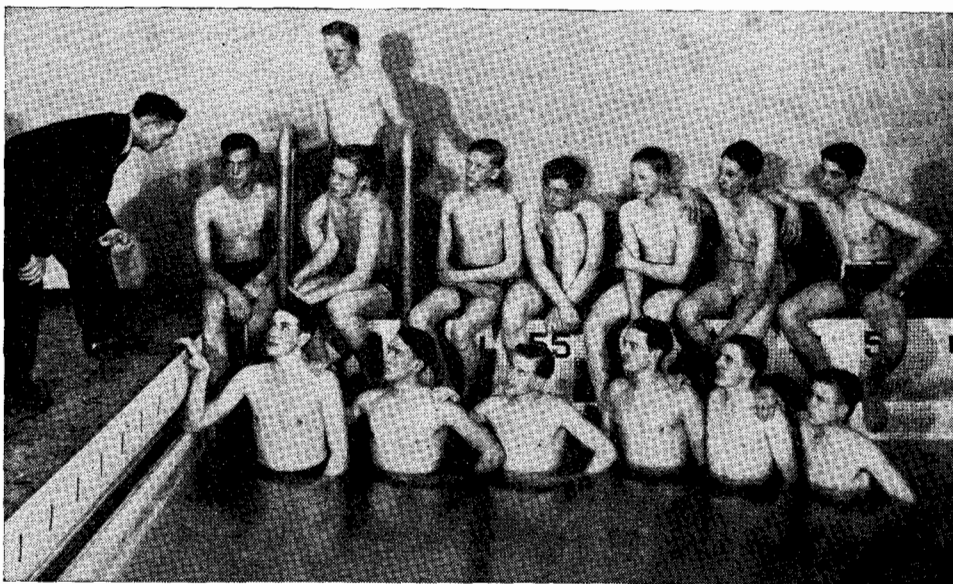

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Livestock Sales A Success

The Winter Shows purebred livestock sales held on February 5 and 6 were, according to consignors and livestock association officials, a great success. A total of 156 animals consigned by breeders of this area sold for \$15,974. Cattle averaged \$170 per head, while bred gilts averaged \$68 and bred ewes \$44.40.

Top animal in the cattle sale was a Hereford bull sold by C. P. Putnam of Tintah to Mike Roesch of Ada for \$325. The top gilt of the sale was a Duroc Jersey sold by Henry Leyh of Bertha to Harold Rosendahl of Warren for \$87.50. The top ewe of the sale was a Hampshire sold by Gordon Clow of Lancaster to Arthur Ratschenski of Drayton, North Dakota, for \$70.00.

Holstein heifers averaged \$127.00; Holstein bulls, \$162; Milking Shorthorn bulls, \$127; Angus bulls, \$193; Angus heifers, \$150; Shorthorn bulls, \$176; Shorthorn heifers, \$136; Hereford bulls, \$218; Hereford heifers, \$176; Hampshire ewes, \$45; Shropshire ewes, \$44; Duroc Jersey gilts, \$65; Berkshire gilts, \$54; Poland China gilts, \$85; Chester White gilts, \$74; Hereford gilts, \$60; Hampshire gilts, \$81; Spotted Poland China gilts, \$80.

Brisk prices for market livestock and an increasing appreciation for good foundation stock is credited with inducing farmers to pay these prices which were the best that have been recorded in the Valley for many years. 4-H Members Awarded Trophies and Plaques

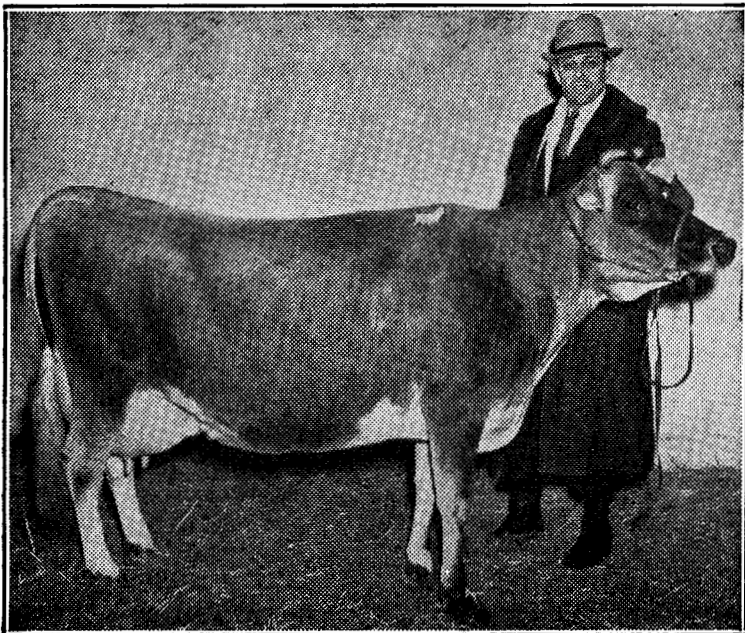
The 4-H club program for the Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week was under the direction of H. A. Pflughoeft, district 4-H club agent. The 4-H contribution to the Winter Shows program included more than one hundred and fifty project entries, demonstrations, and exhibits, and a state 4-H display.

Verdie Gysland of Gary won the silver loving cup for dairy and beef showmanship presented by the Crookston Rotary Club. He also won the 4-H dairy calf plaque, awarded by the Red River Valley Dairymen's Association, for the third consecutive year and thereby became permanent owner of the plaque.

First place beef showman was Willard Purath of Red Lake Falls. Harold Rosendahl of Warren won first in pig showmanship.

The 4-H Junior Sheep Exhibit trophy was won by Lyle Clow of Hallock, a Northwest School student. Hubert Anderson of Angus won the 4-H Junior Beef Calf trophy. Harry Howard of Warren was awarded the 4-H Junior Swine Trophy; this was awarded him permanently for having won it three times.

Judging Teams at Winter Shows Rank High

The subcollegiate crops judging team from the Northwest School ranked second in the annual Winter Shows interstate contest with a total score of 5621 points. The North Central School at Grand Rapids won the cup with a score of 5663. Other schools of agriculture ranking in order were Central School, St. Paul; West Central School, Morris; South Dakota, School of Agriculture; and Walsh County Agricultural School of Park River, North Dakota. Gilbert Reese of the Northwest School, with a score of 1898, ranked third in individual score. R. S. Dunham was coach of the Northwest School team.

In the subcollegiate livestock judging contests, the team from the Central School, St. Paul, won high honors with a score of 2239 points followed in order by North Central with 2216 points, and Northwest School with 2216 points. Henry Hoff of Fergus Falls, a member of the Northwest School team, was high man in the contest with an individual score of 792. Irwin Johnson of the Northwest School team was high man in dairy cattle judging. The team was coached by O. M. Kiser.

The high ranking farmers' club in dairy judging was a Pennington county team composed of Floyd Johnson, Melvin Saugen, and Oscar Vigen. The Crookston-Parnell Farmers' Club of West Polk county, which won a plaque for the highest ranking farmers' team from a single club, was awarded second place in the general contest.

In the high school dairy livestock judging, twenty-four teams were entered. Park Rapids High School won first honors followed in order by Lake Park, Blackduck, and Bemidji.

Eighteen high schools entered teams in the general livestock judging contest. Winners of the first four placings in order of merit were Ulen, Deer River, Fosston, and Bemidji.

Seven county 4-H club general livestock judging teams were entered in the general livestock judging. Top honors were won by a team from Marshall county followed in order by teams from Clay, Pennington, and West Polk counties.

The champion 4-H club dairy judging team was entered from Roseau county with teams from East Polk and Wadena counties ranking second and third respectively.
