141 Students Graduated March 26 Students Presented Scholarships and Special Awards

Eighty-one Seniors and sixty Advanced students at the Northwest School of Agriculture received diplomas and advanced certificates at the thirty-fourth annual Commencement of the school held on Thursday afternoon, March 26. Superintendent T. M. McCall announced that, to date, 2,481 students had received diplomas or advanced certificates during the thirty-six years since the founding of the school.

Events leading up to the final graduation exercises of interest to the graduating classes included Advanced Day, March 17; Senior Day, March 19; a reception for the Senior class on March 22 by Superintendent and Mrs. T. M. McCall; and baccalaureate exercises on Sunday, March 22.

Commencement exercises were held on the afternoon of March 26 in the school auditorium.

The Commencement address, "Coming of Age in a World Crisis" was delivered by Superintendent T. H. Fenske of the West Central School of Agriculture at Morris. Miss Irene Olson of Halstad, president of the Senior class, paid tribute to the parents and faculty for their assistance during their years of schooling.

At the Commencement exercises, cash scholarships provided by the Northwest School alumni and income from Caleb Dorr, University Trust Funds, and the O. W. Peterson Memorial Fund were awarded to students making the greatest progress in scholarship and music. Plaques, scholarship certificates, and trophies were awarded to members of the Advanced class for citizenship, excellence in dramatics, high scholarship, and athletics.

Approximately one-half of the graduates from the fourth-year course expect to enter college next fall, and a larger percentage of Seniors expect to return to the Northwest School for their Advanced year.

A few of the students plan on entering various branches of military service at once; all of the other 371 students in attendance during the year left for their homes to assist in the war production effort.

Adopting Farm Machinery to War Time Production

Rules to be considered in adopting farm machinery for maximum efficiency in food production on the farm:

1. Provide tractor with a system of lights for night work during rush seasons.

2. Take special care in lubrication: a. Use the proper grade and quality of oil or grease; b. watch condition of oil filter carefully; c. keep tractor engine operating at best temperature; d. replace worn or defective grease seals to keep dirt out and grease or oil in.

3. Service air cleaners thoroughly and often.

4. Make adjustments to compensate for changes in fuel quality: a. As production and operation of aircraft increases, there will be an increased demand for high octane fuel; b. moderate changes in fuel octane can be compensated for by retarding the spark a few degrees; c. slight reductions in power will result from the use of lower octane fuel. The reduction should not, however, be more than a few percent.

5. Care of tires: a. Always maintain tire pressure appropriate to conditions of tire size, tire load and type of service; b. Keep tractor tires at the right pressure for the work you are doing; c. provide wheel weight to get the best traction; d. rim changes may become necessary if special tire sizes for farm implements become scarce; e. examine tires at intervals.

6. Take care of repairs early: a. There will be a heavy demand for repairs this year and still heavier demand next year. In some cases repair parts may not be obtainable immediately. Last minute repairs may be impossible or may require welding badly worn parts at excessive cost; b. broken or worn parts in otherwise good condition may be salvaged by welding.

7. New or used tillage tools may be given added life by the use of hard surfacing. Farmers in sandy or gravelly soil will benefit more by the use of hard facing materials.

8. Take proper care of belts, ropes, canvas, etc.: a. dress belts only with suitable high quality dressings. Many belts are damaged by the dressing used; b. keep ropes sheltered from the weather as much as possible; c. protect canvas parts from weather and mildew; d. if you lack suitable shelter for farm machines, considerable protection may be had by a liberal use of oil or grease (or better yet, paint).

9. Keep machines properly adjusted: a. proper attention to adjustments, minor adjustments included, may serve to add years to machine life.

10. Adopt labor saving practices: a. pull optimum loads. Adjust your loads to the power you have; b. cut corners that are within good practices. If a field cultivator will serve as well as a plow to control weeds and produce a good crop, there is no point in doing

Development Association Tree Planting Contests

The Red River Valley Development Association directors at their February meeting voted to make Northwest School students eligible along with 4-H club members for Association prizes for tree planting. A silver medal is given each year to the boy or girl in the Red River Valley making the greatest achievement in tree planting.

Donald Geddes of Polk county, a 4-H club member and a graduate of the Northwest School, was the winner of the medal in 1941. In addition to the medal, the Development Association has set aside one hundred dollars for tree and shrub premiums to be distributed among counties for excellence in three divisions of the contest. A boy or girl may enter any one or all three parts of the contest in any one year. The three phases of the contest are: 1. growing 500 young trees from seeds or cuttings; 2. transplanting to a nursery row 500 or more seedlings or rooted cuttings; 3. planting 500 or more trees in a windbreak.

the extra work required by the plowing operation; c. utilize custom practices at fair rates of compensation for custom work. Use the most modern machine available.

The Home Vegetable Garden

J. H. Wampole

1. Every farm should have a garden of sufficient size to produce all vegetables needed for the year ($\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ acres).
2. Heavy soils should be fall plowed to permit timely seeding of early crops.
3. Fertilize garden by plowing under 8 to 10 tons of well-rotted manure each year.
4. Do not permit weeds to cover garden in late summer (cut worm moths lay eggs on leaf sheaths of grassy weeds).
5. Have at least one good dust and one liquid sprayer (small size) for use in controlling garden insects and diseases.
6. Have on hand some effective insecticide such as calcium arsenate or Paris green for leaf eating insects; Black Leaf 40, Evergreen or soap sprays for sucking insects. Copper sprays for plant diseases.
7. Provide good garden tools:
 - a. A garden seed drill is essential for sowing high priced seed, and to secure uniform planting.
 - b. Wheel hoes, push and pull hoes help lighten work in garden.
 - c. Only good steel hoes and rakes should be purchased.
 - d. Keep soil working tools from rusting. Use oil or grease on working surfaces when stored.
8. Plan your garden so crops can be planted in order of date of planting; group crops requiring same spacings and cultivations.
9. Small tender seedling row crops must be given hand cultivations along line of row until large enough for field cultivators.
10. Plant crops in long rows across garden—several crops of similar growth habits may be planted in sections of long rows.
11. Plan for a succession of crops: (a) by successive plantings of desirable varieties (b) planting a number of varieties at one time which mature at different intervals.
12. Buy best quality of seed obtainable.
13. Buy best quality varieties of vegetables (see recommended list of varieties by Northwest Experiment Station).
14. Early varieties of all crops are generally best in Northwestern Minnesota.
15. Concentrate on crops most useful for canning or storage.
16. Crops of major importance are: tomatoes, sweet corn, peas, beans; greens—spinach, chard; carrots, beets, rutabagas, onions, squash. Melons and miscellaneous crops add interest to gardens.
17. Provide dry storage for onions, squash. Provide cool humid storage for
