## COMMENCEMENT DAY - MARCH 24

### Commencement To Be Held March 24

Commencement will be held at the Northwest School on Wednesday, March 24, this year instead of the traditional Thursday of past years. The students and faculty, by observing Lincoln's Birthday, a legal holiday, with a program and classes have advanced the closing of school by one day which permits an early return to farm and home work. Graduation exercises for the Senior and Advanced classes will be held on that day at 2:00 p. m. The afternoon Commencement time, instead of the evening Commencement exercises which has been followed for the past two years, has met with general approval in that it permits parents and graduates to return to their homes in daylight hours.

Senior Day, scheduled for Thursday, March 18, officially opens the Commencement week activities. Other Commencement week activities for the graduates include the reception to the Senior class given by Superintendent and Mrs. T. M. McCall on Sunday afternoon, March 21, followed by the Baccalaureate exercises on Sunday evening at eight o'clock; the Junior music recital on Monday afternoon, March 22, and senior music recital on Tuesday evening, March 23; and Commencement at 2:00 p. m. on March 24.

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## New Sales Record Set At Winter Shows

A new record of total sales was established at the purebred livestock sales on February 4 and 5 at the Red River Valley Winter Shows at Crookston when more than \$25,000 was paid for some two hundred head of livestock.

The second highlight of the livestock sales was the fact that consignors took a good share of their sales receipts in war bonds. One-third of the sellers took all of their proceeds in bonds; one-third took fifty percent, with the remaining sellers taking at least one \$18.75 bond.

At the sale of bred ewes and gilts on February 4, the top Shropshire ewe, consigned by Hubert F. Boeddeker, Perley, sold for \$80 to Earl W. Crown, Red Lake Falls. The top Hampshire ewe consigned by Gordon Clow, Lancaster, also sold for \$80, the buyer being Christian Williamson, Grafton, North Dakota. The sale of 49 purebred ewes brought \$1,846.00, with Hampshires averaging \$46.90 and Shropshires \$35.30.

The top Duroc Jersey Bred gilt consigned to the sale by Arthur Howard, Warren, sold for \$135 to Hull Bradley and Son, Beltrami. The Spotted Poland China Gilt consigned by Erwin Peterson, Twin Valley, went to Kenneth Visser of Ada, for \$135.

Average price paid for bred gilts were as follows: Duroc Jerseys—\$86.03; Chester Whites—\$106.36; Spotted Poland Chinas—\$116.92; Berkshires—\$81.87; Hampshires (only two in the Shows)—\$100.00; Herefords—\$81.66; and Polands—\$92.37.

Average prices paid for bred gilts at this year's sale ranged \$20 to \$30 higher than the 1942 Sale. The top gilt and ewe in last year's sale sold for \$68.00 and \$44.00 respectively. Top price paid for the best gilt this year exceeded last year's high of \$87.50 by slightly over \$45.00.

Hundreds of Red River Valley farmers were on hand on Friday, February 5, to bid for purebred registered cattle consigned to the 1943 sale.

Top Heifer, a Hereford sold by Eddie Gronseth, went to Charley E. Kiewel of Crookston for \$510.00. The top of \$550.00 was paid for the Hereford bull consigned by Olson Bros., Argusville, North Dakota. Top bull went to Farup Ranch, Park River, North Dakota.

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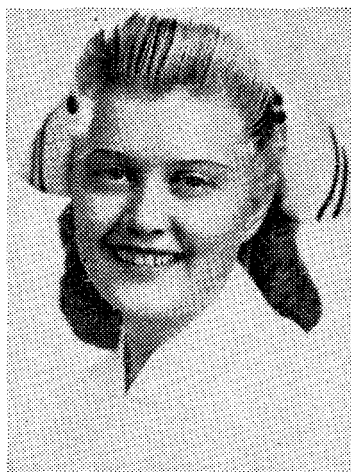
## Mid-Term Honor Roll
