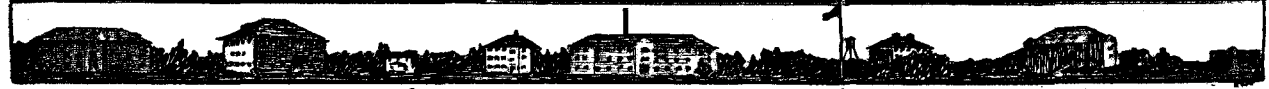

114 Students Graduate March 24 Students Presented Scholarships and Special Awards

A total of 114 students received diplomas and advanced certificates at the Commencement Exercises at the Northwest School on March 24. Sixty-nine students received diplomas from the regular three-year course and forty-five students were granted fourth year certificates.

The processional march was played by the school orchestra under the direction of Miss Marian Frykman; the Reverend G. J. Heitmann of Crookston pronounced the invocation; Robert Philips of Noyes, president of the Senior class, gave the class address. The school choir under the direction of Miss Ingwelde Pfitzner sang "Lord Bestow on Us Thy Blessing"—Sicilian Melody, and "Dear Land of Home"—Sibelius. The speech choir, under the direction of Miss Martha Manning, read "Opportunity"—Edward R. Sill, "The Four Little Foxes"—Lew Sarett, and "When Earth's Last Picture is Painted"—by Rudyard Kipling.

Dr. C. H. Bailey, dean and director of the Agricultural College and Experiment Station, University of Minnesota, gave the Commencement address. Dean Bailey, in speaking on the subject "This Land In Which We Live" pointed out that Minnesota is an inland empire larger than Belgium, Holland, Denmark, and Hungary combined. It covers about as much land area as did Austria Czechoslovakia before they were absorbed by the German Reich. Minnesota is ninety-five per cent as large as Great Britain and seventy per cent as large as Italy. Dr. Bailey brought out the fact that while our state has great resources in mineral and forest wealth, yet the resources in soil and their potential possibilities were a challenge to the citizenry to make our state a leading one in food production.

The geologic history of the Red River Valley, according to Dean Bailey, explains how the fertile alluvial soils of the Red River Valley were formed. In briefly tracing the agricultural history of the Valley area, he quoted excerpts of the essay "The Passing of the Prairie Schooner" by former W. A. Marin of Crookston.

In concluding his address, Dean Bailey pointed out that the present youth represents a link that binds the past to the future and that the Red River Valley is an arsenal of demo-

cracy which demands the best energies and the fulfillment of the highest ideals of our youth today.

Superintendent T. M. McCall presented diplomas and certificates to the graduating classes and made the scholarship and honor awards.

Six Caleb Dorr scholarships, valued at fifteen dollars each, were awarded to the boy and girl of the freshmen, junior, and senior classes who made the greatest progress in their school work during the year. The two Northwest School Alumni Association scholarships of twenty-five dollars each were awarded to the boy or girl from the freshmen and junior classes who made the most outstanding scholastic record. Cash scholarships awarded to students are to be used for school expenses during the school year of 1943-44.

First Superintendent of Northwest Station Dies

T. A. Hoverstad, first superintendent of the Northwest Experiment Station, Crookston, 1895 to 1905, died after a lingering illness at the home of his daughter Mrs. Lloyd I. Nelson in St. Paul, on Friday, March 26, at the age of seventy-five years.

In paying tribute to T. A. Hoverstad, Superintendent T. M. McCall of the Northwest School and Station writes: "The faith of Torger A. Hoverstad in the future of the Red River Valley and the Northwest School and Experiment Station has been a source of inspiration to me since our first meeting at the school back in 1911. His enthusiasm for progressive practices and organizations which made for development of the Red River Valley brought him back to the School and Station one or two times a year.

T. A. Hoverstad made a great contribution to the agricultural development of Northwestern Minnesota during his ten-year stay at the Northwest Station. He was one of the organizers of the Red River Valley Dairymen's Association in 1903 and has been given due recognition by that organization for his contribution at their various anniversary celebrations. He was an ardent

advocate of tree planting on prairie farms and planted several thousand trees in demonstration plots which make up the larger portion of the windbreak at the Northwest School and Station. The lack of adequate drainage hampered progress of the work at the Experiment Station during Mr. Hoverstad's administration. He was an advocate of surface drainage for prairie farms and was instrumental in helping get drainage for the Experiment Station. The work at the Experiment Station, 1895 to 1905, was carried on in close cooperation with the Minnesota Experiment Station which was then directed by Willet M. Hays who did much to improve varieties of wheat and other cereals.

After leaving Crookston in 1905, Mr. Hoverstad went in to broader fields of work as Director of Farmers' Institutes in North Dakota and later as Agricultural Development Agent of the Soo Line and Great Western railway.

The entire northwest has lost, in the passing of Mr. Hoverstad, one of the pioneers who remained in the forefront of agricultural progress."

Wrestling Team Wins From North Central

The Northwest Aggie wrestling team won one and tied one wrestling match with the North Central Aggies of Grand Rapids at the wrestling meets held at the Northwest School on March 12 and 13.

The score of the first meet, on March 12, ended in a 16 to 16 tie; the second match on March 13 was won by the Northwest Aggies by a score of 18-13.
