Parents' Association Has Annual Meeting And Election Of Officers

The Northwest School Parents' Association held its annual meeting at the Northwest School on Saturday, November 6, in connection with the twenty-fourth annual Parents' Day program.

The county directors of the Parents' Association met with Vice-President Mrs. Claude Phillips of Noyes for a special meeting at 11:00 A. M. The annual business meeting was held following the Parents' Day dinner at which time officers were elected for 1944 and resolutions were adopted.

The nominating committee for county directors consisted of Herbert Johnston, Angus; Mark McGovern, St. Vincent, and Charles Hardrath of Crookston. The resolutions committee consisted of J. H. Sargent and V. M. Gibbons of Crookston and Walter Ross of Fisher.

At the general session of the Parents' Association, Superintendent T. M. McCall was called to speak on the subject of "School Credits for Northwest School Students." Superintendent McCall pointed out the fact that the four Schools of Agriculture are special schools of subcollegiate grade which were established by the State Legislature and governed by the University Board of Regents, the president of the University of Minnesota, and the Dean of the Department of Agriculture. The schools were established primarily to equalize the educational opportunities of the farm boys and girls whose services are required on the farms during the cropping season with students who were able to attend the full academic year. He pointed out that the Agricultural Schools are accredited by the University and that all four-year graduates can enter as freshmen in any of the universities and colleges of Minnesota and other states.

At the business session, the Parents' Association voted to make the funds in the treasury available as a student

Premiums in the livestock and poultry departments are paid by grants from the Minnesota legislature. The crops show is sponsored by the Red River Valley Development Association which receives support from the Red River Valley counties.

Features of the Winter Shows week will be exhibitions of livestock, poultry, the best herds and flocks in the Red River Valley area, exhibits of small grain and potatoes from amateur and professional growers, and industrial exhibits.

Ernest Rydeen Memorial Service Held

Impressive memorial services for Private Ernest Rydeen, '40, were held at the Clearbrook High School on Sunday, October 31, under the auspices of the local American Legion and Legion Auxiliary.

Ernest, the second known casualty of the Northwest School students in World War II, enlisted in the United States Army Air Service in September 1940. He was taken prisoner of war by the Japanese on Bataan Peninsula in the Philippines on May 7, 1942, and died in Hoten Prisoner of War Camp at Mukden, Manchukuo, on June 29, 1943.

Mr. Oscar Lewis, Ninth District commander of the American Legion, was in charge of the memorial service. Speakers on the program included Commander Lewis, Reverend Lundgren, the president of the Women's Auxiliary—Clearbrook Legion Post, and Superintendent T. M. McCall.
