President Walter C. Coffey, Commencement Speaker

Dr. Walter C. Coffey, president of the University of Minnesota, will give the Commencement address at the 36th annual graduation exercises at the Northwest School on Thursday, March 23. A total of 141 candidates are qualifying for diplomas and certificates from the regular and advanced courses. The Senior class has a membership of 102 students, while the fourth year or Advanced class has a membership of 39.

Commencement season activities start with the Junior-Senior banquet and Prom on Saturday, March 4. The Advanced Day program will be given at a special assembly on March 14. Senior Day will be observed on Friday, March 17, with the class day exercises at the assembly hour. The senior class play will be given March 16.

The Senior class reception given by Superintendent and Mrs. T. M. McCall will be held on Sunday afternoon, March 19. The Baccalaureate exercises will be held in the school auditorium at 7:30 p. m. on Sunday, March 19, with the Reverend John G. Lewis of Crookston as speaker.

On Monday, March 20, the Junior music recital will be held at 4:00 p. m., and the Senior music recital will be held on Wednesday evening, March 22. Commencement exercises are scheduled for 2:00 p. m. on Thursday, March 23. The Commencement exercises have been set for the afternoon in recent years to permit students and parents to return to their homes in daylight hours.

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Athletic Teams Completing Schedules

With little more than three weeks remaining of the winter term, the Northwest School athletic teams are completing their season's schedules with good records and a large number of boys participating. Teams have been competing in four major sports during the term with the basketball and hockey squads being coached by A. K. Baldwin and the swimming and wrestling squads by E. F. Bennett.

With four games left to be played the basketball team has two wins and no losses in league competition. Two games are yet to be played with Grand Rapids Agricultural School for the league title. In all games played the record stands at 7 wins and 9 losses. Final games of the season will be played at the Northwest School on March 10 and 11, with Grand Rapids Aggies furnishing the opposition in both games.

The hockey team, because of travel limitations, has played but four games during the season thus far, winning two from the Crookston Central team, losing one to the Fargo High School team, and losing one to the Crookston Cathedral six. Winter Shows Dates for 1945 To Be February 5-9

At a meeting of the Board of Managers of the Red River Valley Winter Shows held on February 4, the dates of February 5-9 were selected for the 1945 Shows. The selected dates are subject to confirmation by the cooperating organizations and later action by the Board in case conditions warrant a change.

1944 Winter Shows Championships

Outstanding herds and flocks from the leading livestock breeders of the Red River Valley made close competition for championship honors at the recent Red River Valley Winter Shows held January 31-February 4. There was keen competition in all classes of livestock except in the Southdown breed of sheep and the Yorkshire breed of hogs where there was only one exhibitor in each breed. The beef cattle and swine shows were the largest in years, with sheep and dairy cattle classes about average.

The utility classes of chickens and waterfowl were much larger this year than in former years, while the turkey show was below average in number of entries.

Livestock Championships: The Swine Herd trophy for the best herd of swine in the show was won by P. M. Finkenbinder and Son of Crookston with a herd of Chester Whites. Swine breeds represented in the Show included Poland China, Berkshire, Yorkshire, Hampshire and Duroc Jersey.

The Best Beef Herd plaque was won by the Angus herd from the LaVoi Stock Farm of Fosston for the second consecutive win. Other beef breeds in the show included Herefords and Polled Herefords and Shorthorns.

P. M. Finkenbinder and Son of Crookston won the Best Dairy Herd plaque with their herd of Milking Shorthorn cattle. Other dairy breeds in competition included Jersey and Holstein.

The Best Flock of Sheep trophy was won by the Hampshire flock of sheep owned by Gordon Clow of Hallock. Other breeds of sheep in competition included Shropshire and Southdown breeds. The new Columbia breed of sheep was on display but not in competition.

In the Crop Show, the corn show was the largest and best in years. The small grain show was about average in the number of exhibits but larger than in 1943. The quality of the winning exhibits in the crops show was pronounced the best in years.

Crops Winners: Peter Schirrick, Sr., of Red Lake Falls, was awarded the bronze plaque for the best sample of grain at the show. He also had the winning flax sample in the professional class and won the sweepstakes flax award. The Grand Champion award in the Amateur class in flax went to Henry Gerlach of Red Lake Falls. The Grand Champion in Rye, Amateur class, was George Burau. The sweepstakes award in the Wheat show went to Tom Botko of Warren, who exhibited a sample of Durum. The grand champion exhibitor of Oats was Veral Gibbons of Crookston who showed in the Amateur class.

Theodore Thompson of Fergus Falls won the sweepstakes award for the best ten ears of corn at the Shows. He also won the bronze trophy offered by the Red River Valley Development Association for the best sample of corn grown in the southern section. In the northern section, Adolph Miller of

Approximately two-hundred head of registered sheep, swine, and cattle were put through the ring by Auctioneer Freddie Chandler.

High animal in the dairy sale was a Holstein bull which was sold by O. G. Gast and Son of Beltrami for \$235. The average for dairy cattle was \$150.42. The high in the sheep sale was a Columbia ewe sold for \$80 by the Hanna Stock Farm of Bordulac, N. D. The average for Columbias was \$74.37. The high Shropshire was a ewe sold by A. Marsden and Son from Hendrum for \$42.50. The average for Shropshires was \$29.00. The high Hampshire ewe was sold by Emil Lerud and Son of Twin Valley for \$75.00 and the average for that breed was \$43.44.

In the swine sale, the high was a Duroc Jersey gilt sold by Henry Leyh of Bertha for \$135. The Duroc average was \$92.19. The spotted Poland China top was a gilt sold for \$115 by Irwin Peterson of Twin Valley, and the average for that breed was \$75.00. The top Poland China was sold by J. H. A new record of War Bond sales was established at the 1944 Red River Valley Winter Shows when donated animals sold at auction on February 3 and 4 brought a total purchase of \$1,378,011 of War Bonds. An additional \$15,000 in War Bonds is expected to be purchased by livestock sales consignors out of proceeds of the sales on February 3 and 4.

The Hereford breeders at the Winter Shows donated a heifer from the Eddie Gronseth herd of Rothsay, Minnesota, for the War Bond sale on February 4. The heifer brought \$1,347,261.00 in War Bonds. Firms which participated in the million dollar bid for the Hereford heifer were Minnesota National Bank of East Grand Forks, Polk County State Bank of Crookston, First National Bank of Crookston, Crookston Trust Company, Farmers' State Bank of Winger, State Bank of Fertile, American State Bank of Erskine, Farmers' State Bank of Fosston, and First National Bank of McIntosh.

A Duroc boar donated to the War Bond sale by C. O. Quist and Son of Crookston was sold to the Ada National Bank for \$25,000 in bonds. A Shropshire ewe donated by Andrew Johnstad of Beltrami was sold to Sam Roningen of Fisher for \$5,750 in War Bonds.
