Capacity Enrollment Assured 500 Attend Crops And Soils For Fall Term

A capacity enrollment at the Northwest School is forecast for the 1944-45 school year which opens on October 2. A total of 374 paid room reservations has been received which means that rooming accommodations for girls have all been taken and only a few rooms for boys remain unassigned. With some twenty names of girls on a "waiting list" for rooms since July first, it was deemed advisable to return all requests for rooms in the girls' dormitory after that date. Housing facili-ties for girls will be inadequate until such time as the new dormitory for girls can be built after the war.

A survey of suitable rooming houses

for students will be made in Crookston during late August and early September. Lists of rooming places complying with University housing regulations will be available well in advance of the

opening of the school year.

Two new courses have been added to the curriculum for 1944-45. General Mathematics, a five-hour course, will be offered to the freshmen for the first time this year. Upper classmen who have not had general mathematics will be required to take Algebra for fourth year credit. Students who complete the General Mathematics will be presented to the Plane complete the General Mathematics course will be prepared to take Plane Geometry which is offered the fourth year students. A new course in Quantity Cookery will be offered senior girls beginning in the fall term. The new course will be taught by Miss Bernice Frohreich, dining hall matron and instructor and instructor.

Opportunities will be given this year to returning war veterans to take re-gular courses or enroll as specials whereby they can secure the particular

training they require.

The regular teaching positions in all departments except athletics have been filled. Instructors in physical education courses will be appointed before September first.

Crops and Soils Day was held at the Northwest School and Station on Monday, July 17, with more than 500 crop growers present for the tour and program

The tour of experimental plots and increase fields of the newer grain varieties was made during the morning under the direction of Agronomist R. S. Dunham assisted by H. W. Soderburg, A. O. Naplin, and O. M. Kiser. Crop growers were particularly interested in the new varieties of wheat, oats, and barley grown in increase plots for distribution to farmers in 1945. The new crop varieties which attracted greatest attention were Mars barley, Newthatch, Carlton, and Mida wheats, and Crystal flax.

Late Blight Is Menace To Potato Crop

Late blight of potatoes, found in centers of potato production in the Red River Valley during the present week, is an active and potential menace to one of the most important food crops one or the most important food crops grown in the region. Surveys made on July 18 by Dr. C. J. Eide, plant pathologist; Dr. A. A. Granovsky, entomologist; and Superintendent T. M. McCall disclosed the presence of blight in several fields and also a progressive spread of the disease in a field where it was first found ten days ago.

Dr. Eide states that applications of either liquid or dust forms of copper sprays must be applied immediately to properly safeguard the potato crop. New foliage as it develops should also be kept covered with protective spray, according to Dr. Eide, which means spraying at intervals of 7 to 10 days for three to five sprayings.

A leaf-spot disease, early blight, is widespread this year. The combined (Continued on Page 2, Col. 2)

LATE BLIGHT IS MENACE TO POTATO CROP

injuries to potato leaves from early blight, potato flea beetles, and leaf hoppers is now causing the premature death of potato foliage in the early planted gardens and fields where a good spraying practice has not been followed.

The thorough spraying of potatoes now with liquid bordeaux mixture or the tribasic copper dust will not kill the disease in infected foliage but will protect the sound leaves from germinating blight spores.

Hot dry weather would check the progress of late blight on the potato crop; however, frequent showers, high humidity, and heavy dews favor the spread of the disease.

The dusting of potatoes with tribasic copper dusts at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre may cost the grower the price of one bag of certified seed. The thorough covering of all potato leaves with protective copper spray is the cheapest form of crop insurance.
