The Northwest Aggie football team closed the season on November 3 with the Agricultural School Conference championship and with one win and three defeats from non-conference teams.

The final game of the season on November 3 was played on a snow-covered field against the Crookston High School Pirates. The game ended in a score of 14-7 in favor of Crookston High. The Aggies were outplayed in the first quarter but during the game made seven first downs to their opponents four. Crookston scored the winning touchdown on a 79 yard run on a returned punt.

During the football season, the Northwest Aggies scored 86 points to 79 for their opponents. The victory over the West Central School was the fourth consecutive win in their inter-school contest for the football trophy "Ossie." The season was successful from the standpoint of progress made. Coach Herschel Lysaker gave a large squad fundamental training in football which will show good results in future teams which makes a very bright outlook for next year's football team.

1945 Winter Shows To Be Held Feb. 5-9

The 35th annual Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week will be held at Crookston during the week of February 5-9. Judges for the livestock and crop shows and the livestock and crop judging contests have been appointed and many of the speakers for the day and evening meetings have been secured. Departmental superintendents of the livestock, poultry, and crop shows have indicated a greater advance interest in all departments of the Winter Shows than has been manifested for many years. The greatest expansion in the crops division is expected in the corn and cereal crops classes. Machinery and implement firms have indicated that their exhibits will be better and larger than at any time during the war.

Emphasis will again be placed on the daily programs. Leaders in the fields of all phases of farming, homemaking, and 4-H club work will bring the latest information in their respective fields to Winter Shows meetings. District organizations such as the Red River Valley Livestock Association, Red River Valley Development Association, Northern Minnesota Poultry Association, and Ninth District Horticultural Society will hold their annual meetings during the Winter Shows. Many other cooperating organizations will have smaller group meetings during the week.

Features of interest to livestock men during the week will be the shows and sales. Some two hundred head of purebred livestock have been consigned to the 1945 sales which are to be held on February 8 and 9; the closing date for listings from consignors has been set for December first.

Date Announced For Interclass Song Contest
