Large Attendance At Crops Day, July 13

The annual Crops Day at the Northwest School and Experiment Station on Friday, July 13, was declared a decided success in spite of intermittent showers. A total of 450 crops men from all of the Red River Valley counties of Minnesota and border counties in North Dakota were present for the meeting and tours. Due to early morning showers, the order of events scheduled for the day were changed. Three of the speakers scheduled for the afternoon program spoke at the morning session and the tours of the fields were made in the late afternoon. Subjects presented by the speakers on the morning program were: "Fertilizer Needs of Red River Valley Soils" by Dr. C. O. Rost, chief of the Division of Soils, University Farm, St. Paul; "New Varieties of Oats, Wheat and Flax for Red River Valley Growers" by Professor R. S. Dunham of the Division of Agronomy and Plant Genetics, University Farm, St. Paul; and "Outlook for New Barley Varieties" by Dr. M. T. Henderson of the Division of Plant Genetics, University Farm, St. Paul.

The early afternoon program was devoted to a discussion of crop diseases and insect pests and their control. The subjects presented and the speakers included: "Crop Diseases of Importance in 1945" by I. W. Tervet of the Division of Plant Pathology, University Farm, St. Paul; "Control of Late Blight and Other Potato Diseases" by Dr. C. J. Eide of the Division of Plant Pathology and Botany, University Farm, St. Paul; and "Control of Insect Pests of Potatoes" by Dr. A. A. Granovsky of the Division of Entomology, University Farm, St. Paul.

The field tour of experimental plots was made under the direction of R. S. Dunham, former agronomist at the Northwest Station, and O. C. Turnquist, horticulturist, with members of staff from the Northwest School and University Farm, St. Paul, assisting. The discussion of new potato varieties and the potato breeding program, at the potato plots, was lead by O. C. Turnquist, Northwest Station horticulturist.

A great deal of interest was shown by farmers in the new varieties of crops under test at the Northwest Experiment Station. New varieties of crops attracting the greatest interest were Minda and Bonda oats, Crystal flax, Mars barley, Carleton and Stewart wheats, and potato seedling numbers 42-1, 639-4-40 and 4738-7-40. The potato numbered seedlings have been distributed in small quantities to selected growers this year and are being increased for distribution for 1946.

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Fall Term Will Open October 1

The fall term of the Northwest School will open on Monday, October 1. The enrollment will be determined by the maximum number of students who can be given dormitory or housing accommodations at the school and in Crookston. All rooms in Robertson and Senior Halls have been engaged now for several weeks and only a few rooms in Stephens Hall are still available for boys.

It has been necessary this year, because of increased advance enrollment of students, to limit enrollment of girls in residence to Minnesota unless they have previously attended; out-of-state enrollments of boys are still accepted. It has also been necessary to hold rigidly to the minimum age requirement of admission of fourteen years for eighth grade graduates. Students must be fourteen years of age on or before January 1, 1946, to enter in the fall term.

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R. S. Dunham Accepts Position At University Farm

R. S. Dunham, assistant professor and agronomist at the Northwest School and Experiment Station since September 1921, has accepted a position in the Division of Agronomy and Plant Genetics at the Minnesota Experiment Station, University Farm, St. Paul. Mr. Dunham has accepted the position as Associate Agronomist with the rank of Associate Professor.

He will conduct research in the field of weed eradication, do teaching in the Agricultural College, and advisory work with the graduate students in Agronomy. He assumed his new duties at University Farm on July first.

Superintendent T. M. McCall, in commenting on Mr. Dunham's new position stated, "We are extremely sorry to lose Mr. Dunham from the Northwest School and Station staff. He has done excellent work in crops investigation and has become one of the leading crops authorities in Minnesota. It is with regret that I accept Mr. Dunham's resignation. I do want to congratulate Mr. Dunham, in behalf of the School and Station, for his fine promotion and the recognition given him by the Division of Agronomy and Plant Genetics. We may not be able to secure a new man to take over the work of Mr. Dunham's position by July first, when his transfer becomes effective; however, a successor will be appointed at an early date."

185 In Attendance For Women's Camp Reunion

A group of 185 former Women's Camp members and their families were in attendance at the twentieth annual meeting of the Northwest School Women's Camp which was held at the Northwest School on Sunday, June 24. The one-day reunion and picnic was held this year to take the place of the three-day camp which has been held during normal times.

Miss M. Beatrice Johnstone of the General Extension Division of the University of North Dakota and Superintendent T. M. McCall were the speakers on the afternoon program. Miss Johnstone spoke on the subject "Women's Place in the Modern World" and Superintendent McCall spoke briefly on the educational program of the school for farm youth and rehabilitation training for returning war veterans.

Miss Retta Bede, general chairman of the arrangements committee, presented "The Thought for the Day." Mrs. Ella Anderson of Fisher, senior camp member with an eighteen-year Women's Camp attendance record, presided at the business meeting in the absence of Mrs. Walter Oberg, president. Camp members voted to have the 1945 officers carry over for 1946 and return to the three-day Women's Camp for next year, war conditions permitting. The recreational program for the boys and girls was directed by Herschell Lysaker.

Mrs. Ella Anderson received the award for the person with the largest attendance record and Mrs. C. H. Roholt of Mayville, North Dakota, won the prize for finding the Golden Horseshoe and also received a recognition prize for seventeen years of attendance at the Women's Camp.

Late Blight A Threat to Potato Crop

Late blight of potatoes may become a serious menace to the Red River Valley potato crop. The late blight which has been found on potato dumps during the past week may, unless it is utterly destroyed there, spread to fields and become the number one crop hazard. If cool and wet weather continues during midsummer and potato growers do not protect their crops with copper sprays, serious losses may result to the crop.

The potato spraying experiments at the Northwest Station have demonstrated that potato plants must have a protective covering of fungicidal sprays continually throughout the growing season for complete control of late blight. During the period of heavy vegetative growth of potato plants, sprayings with copper sprays should be made at intervals of from 7 to 10 days. Complete eradication of late blight can come only through the destruction of all foliage growth from potatoes on potato dumps and a thorough spraying program.

Chinese Graduates At School For Special Training

Two Chinese graduates in mechanical engineering arrived at the Northwest School and Station on July 14 for two months of general farm experience. The graduate students, P. C. Hsu and T. C. Chang, are two of a group of five Chinese students who have won scholarships offered by the International Harvester Company. Mr. Hsu, a native of Kiangyng, Kiangsu, is a graduate of the National Central University and he has served as an assistant at National Chungking University. Mr. Chang, a native of Poyang, Kiangsi, graduated from the National Southwest Associated University where he served as assistant in the College of Engineering. The men arrived from China by way of the Mediterranean sailing from Calcutta, India.

While at the Northwest School during the summer months, the men will be given experience and training in the departments of agronomy, animal husbandry, horticulture, poultry husbandry, and farm engineering.

Dr. W. C. Coffey Retires From Presidency Of The University

Dr. Walter C. Coffey, former Dean of the Department of Agriculture and more recently president of the University of Minnesota, retired from active service to the University on July first. Although Dr. Coffey reached the retirement age one year ago, he graciously consented to serve as president until a successor could be named.

Under Dr. Coffey's leadership in the field of agricultural research, the Minnesota Experiment Station has risen to the forefront among the state Experiment Stations. The Agricultural College and the Schools of Agriculture have made their greatest growth during his administration and the whole University was guided successfully by him through the most critical war years.

Former President Coffey is well and favorably known over the entire state where he is still affectionately known as Dean Coffey. Dr. and Mrs. Coffey will remain in Minnesota and reside at University Grove near University Farm, St. Paul.

In Memoriam

Two more gold stars have been added to the Military Service Roll of Northwest School graduates and former students in World War II. The sympathy of members of staff and classmates is extended to parents and members of families of Pvt. Russell Theiling of Grygla and PFC Russell Hanson of Twin Valley.

PFC Russell Theiling was killed in action by sniper fire along the National Road, near Bagui, in the Philippine Islands, on April 24. Russell volunteered to assist in getting a wounded comrade from the front lines and was killed while doing that act of mercy.

PFC Russell Hanson, paratrooper, was killed in action in Germany on April 30. Russell was killed in action while trying to rescue a comrade from an exploded incendiary bomb.

The boys were buried with full military honors near their respective battle fields.
