The 38th annual Commencement exercises will be held at the Northwest School on Thursday, March 28, at 2:00 p.m. Dr. John C. West, president of the University of North Dakota, has been secured as speaker.

A total of 140 candidates are qualifying for diplomas and certificates of graduation from the Regular and Advanced classes. The Senior class, with a membership of 87 members, equals in number the class of 1945. The Advanced class has a membership of 53.

The Junior-Senior banquet and prom, the first of the Commencement season activities, was held on Saturday evening, March 2. Advanced Day will be held on Wednesday, March 20, and the Senior class day and program will be held on Friday, March 22.

The Baccalaureate exercises will be held on Sunday evening, March 24, at 7:30 p.m. with the Reverend R. J. Molander of Crookston as speaker.

### Northwest Aggies Win Basketball Conference Title

A perfect record of four wins in four Conference games gave the Northwest Aggie basketball team a clear title to the Agricultural School Conference.

The Northwest Aggies began one of their most successful seasons with the return of only three lettermen. Graduation last spring took a heavy toll, claiming the first eight players and leaving only three lettermen reserves. Returning lettermen were Co-captains Russell Evje, and Armin Ross and David Erickson who made his letter as a Freshman.

During the three contests before vacation various combinations were tried. The pre-holiday schedule found the Northwest Aggies winning from Climax 19-16, Halstad 25-22 and losing a close one in the final seconds to Fertile 28-29.

After the holidays, workouts began in earnest with the squad being strengthened by two transfer students, Allan Carlson and John Gilbertson.

After the third day of school the Aggies lost to a veteran Erskine team 33-27 after leading the whole first half. Conference competition started at Grand Rapids with our team winning 36-22. The Northwest Aggies went on to win the undisputed Conference Basketball Championship by defeating Grand Rapids in a second game 54-15 and Morris 37-28 and 41-34. Playing fine ball all the way, the Aggies went on to defeat Halstad, Climax, Park River Aggies, Fisher, while games were split with Crookston and Warren, a second game was dropped to Erskine and East Grand Forks nosed out the Ags twice by one point victories. The 1945-46 team won 12 out of 19 games played.

## Potato Disease Control Campaign Launched

A concerted program on the control and eradication of two serious diseases of the potato, ring rot and late blight, in the Red River Valley is being waged now by the county agricultural agents, state seed certification, and agricultural extension division of St. Paul and the Northwest Experiment Station at Crookston. The program of clean seed, good sanitation and correct spraying practices to control and eradicate ring rot and late blight, respectively, is being taken directly to the potato growers by A. G. Tolaas, chief of the Division of Potato Seed Certification, State Department of Agriculture; R. C. Rose, extension pathologist from University Farm, St. Paul; and the county agricultural agents.

O. C. Turnquist, horticulturist at the Northwest School and Station, Crookston, in the second of a series of articles on ring rot of the potato gives the chief identification characteristics of the disease. Mr. Turnquist states, "All potato growers should learn the chief identification characteristics of our most serious disease of the potato. Ring rot, a bacterial disease of the stem and tuber, causes a wilted condition in the plants during the latter part of the growing season due to the fact that the water conducting vessels get clogged up with bacteria. In the potato tuber, a cheesy yellow rot develops which is often followed by a soft rot that destroys the potato in the field or in storage. Not all the infected potatoes will rot completely; the remaining potatoes in the field or bin can spread bacteria to healthy tubers nearby. Usually when a thin slice is cut from the stem end of an infected tuber, a yellow or brown discoloration can be seen in the growth ring. If such a tuber is squeezed, the outer layer may separate from the portion inside the growth ring or a bacterial ooze will be squeezed out of the ring. The disease is spread by direct contact. The bacterial ooze infects baskets, bags, bins, trucks, hands of cutters, planters and every object touched by contaminated seed.

The four-point control program for ring rot set up by the potato specialists in Minnesota recommends (1) the selling out of all contaminated seed lots as table stock, (2) the cleaning up of all premises, storage warehouses, trucks and all potato machinery, (3) the introduction of clean certified seed, (4) keeping of seed clean by following a thorough and rigid sanitation program.

The storage space should be cleaned free of culls and dirt and thoroughly disinfected with Kreso Dip 3%-5% or Liquor Cresolis 3%-5%. New seed sold in old dirty sacks should not be accepted. Any possible chance of infection through the use of contaminated equipment should be avoided. Every object with which the potato comes in contact, such as bags, cutting

knives, planters, diggers, pickers' gloves, baskets, and graders is a potential source of infection if the equipment has been previously contaminated. All dirt and refuse should be cleaned off from any equipment or storage space before it is disinfected.

A serious disease such as ring rot requires a religious adherence to rules of sanitation."
