#### **Northwest School Enrollment** Reaches High Mark

A fall term enrollment of 413 students at the Northwest School has filled to capacity all school dormitories and all available student rooms in the city of Crookston. Many of the more than eighty students on the waiting list for dormitory rooms have made arrangements to attend school elsewhere while others are waiting for another year to get rooms in the school dormitories.

A number of new students could be accommodated with rooms for the win-ter term if the new dormitory for girls is completed on schedule. The genis completed on schedule. The general contractor for the building has given assurance that the building will be completed; however, recent progress in building construction has been slow. Commitments on room assignments to the new dormitory will be deferred until December first.

The enrollment by classes is: Freshmen, 108; Juniors, 125; Seniors, 101; Advanced, 74; Special, 5, or a total of 302 boys and 109 girls.

The large enrollment has increased the teaching load of all instructors and taxed the capacity of classrooms and laboratories. Lack of laboratory space is felt particularly by the departments of animal and poultry husbandry. The present Animal Products Building is much too small for the laboratory classes which should be meeting there.

### Fire Prevention Week Observed By Special Program

A talk on fire prevention and a demonstration by the Crookston Fire Department were features of the assembly program at the Northwest School on October 11 in recognition of Fire Prevention Week. The Northwest School, in cooperation with several agencies in Crookston, sponsored the fire prevention program. Osmund Strander of the Strander Abstract Company spoke on fire prevention. The concluding part of the program was a demonstration on the campus by the Crookston Fire Department under the direction of Fire Chief Wm. Herbert and Armand Loken. The fire depart-ment demonstrated their methods of dealing with farm fires through the use of the water tank on the fire truck and water from an improvised stock tank. The use of the fog spray in dealing with gasoline fires was demonstrated; demonstrations were also given in going through smoke and the use of small fire extinguishers. The fire department concluded the demonstration showing the use of the modern fire pump in discharging a large quantity of water on a fire.

E. N. Reiersgord, Registrar, presided at the program in the auditorium. A.

M. Foker was chairman of arrangements for the outdoor demonstration with the fire department. Representatives of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Crookston assisted in the arrangements for the demonstration.

#### Harold B. Schuck Loan and Students Elect Class Officers Scholarship Fund Established

The first one-third of a \$1,000 bequest establishing the Harold B. Schuck Memorial Loan and Scholarship Fund for Northwest School students has been received from Mrs. Rebecca A. Schuck of Long Beach, California. Mrs. Schuck is making the \$1,000 bequest to the Northwest School in memory of her son Harold B. Schuck, a graduate of the Advanced class of 1915, who was killed in an airplane crash on October 9, 1925. Harwill be remembered as an outstanding student of his class and a leader in many school activities. Har-old's father, the late George B. Schuck, was a successful farmer living south-west of Crookston, and he and Mrs. Schuck were prominent leaders in church and civic affairs in the Crookston community. They were charter members of the Fairfax - Andover Community Club. Mrs. Schuck was instrumental in the establishment of the Fairfax-Andover Loan Fund, the first private loan fund available to Northwest School students.

It is the wish of the donor that the

Harold B. Schuck Memorial Loan Fund be used as a revolving loan fund for students in need of funds to complete their last year in school. In case the loan funds are not needed, then the interest on the principal will be used for scholarships to worthy students. The administration of the loan fund will be left to the Northwest School Scholarship Committee. Formal acceptance of the bequest will be made by the University Board of Regents.


Crookston.

Eight students at the Northwest School were awarded special scholar-ships provided by the Sears, Roebuck Company and Land O'Lakes Creameries, Incorporated.



(continued from page 2) tinued this year. Four lots of thirty lambs each were fed varying amounts of sugar beet tops and sugar beet silage last year for very satisfactory gains in all lots. While no definite conclusions can be drawn from the one-year test; however, it is apparent that the feeding value of the tops exceeds their fertilizing value when worked back in the land. The feeding trials of 1946-47 should point to definite conclusions regarding the value of beet tops when handled as air-dry tops or beet top

The feeding trials are being conducted cooperatively by the Department of Animal Husbandry at the Northwest Experiment Station with O. M. Kiser in charge and the Division of Animal and Poultry Husbandry, University Farm, St. Paul, with W. H. Peters, chief of the Division, as con-

sultant.
