Northwest Aggies Football Team Closes Season Undefeated

The Northwest Aggie football team from the Northwest School of Agriculture closed its season on November 8 with the Agricultural School Conference championship and an undefeated season. Games were won from Warroad, Roseau, Fosston, Mahnomen, Crookston Cathedral high schools, and Walsh County Aggies, Park River, N. D., and West Central Aggies from Morris in the Agricultural School Conference. The Northwest Aggies piled up a total of 215 points to a total of 24 for their opponents. The Aggies in their closest encounter defeated the West Central Aggies by a score of 20-18.

H. H. Lysaker, coach and athletic director, announces that many of the stars of the 1946 football team will be lost to the 1947 squad through graduation. With a large number of promising players in the present second and third teams, a good team is in prospect for 1947.

Late Fall Weather

Favorable For Farm Work

The last two weeks in October and the first two weeks in November were ideal for all farm operations. Heavy rainfall and cloudy weather in late September and early October retarded potato and sugar beet harvest and made soil conditions unfavorable for the use of the new sugar beet harvesting machines. Potato growers had difficulty in maintaining full-sized picking crews during the wet weather of September. Only light frosts occurred during late September and October which kept the frost injury to potatoes to almost a negligible percentage. The last potato harvesting was completed during the last week in October which was about two weeks later than normal. The last of the sugar beet crop was lifted during the first week in November, seven to ten days later than normal. Potato yields for the Red River Valley have been estimated at 140 bushels per acre and sugar beets 10.5 per acre. Quite accurate yield records will be available during December.

Observations made by staff members and parents of school students indicate that the crop land of the Red River Valley counties is going into the winter in the best condition it has been for many years. Bright weather with freezing nights in November has been favorable for late fallowing of land and for late fall plowing. A record amount of surface ditching has been done on the heavy soil areas of the Red River Valley counties. A large percentage of the corn saved for husking has now been harvested. The region is well prepared for a maximum acreage of food and feed crops for 1947.

An impressive memorial program was held on Armistice Day at the Northwest School honoring the war dead of World War I and World War II. Howard Balk of Bagley, 9th district commander of the American Legion, gave a stirring memorial address on "Our Country." Mr. Balk, a member of the class of '24, is a veteran of World War I and now serving as Agricultural Extension Agent of Clearwater county.

New Oat and Flax Varieties

Considerable interest has been aroused in Clinton oats, a new variety that has recently been developed at the Iowa Experiment Station. This variety will not be available for general distribution here this coming year because the Iowa Station is not releasing any seed stocks. For this reason, a warning has been issued by the Minnesota Crop Improvement Association against buying Clinton oats unless it is properly certified and can be traced back to the foundation seed stock.

There are two new varieties of oats, Mindo and Bonda, that will be available in limited amounts this coming year. These varieties were increased this past season by several approved growers under contract to the Experiment Station. This contract has been lifted and these growers are being asked to release at least fifty per cent of their crop to other growers.

Mindo and Bonda were developed by the Minnesota Experiment Station and are superior to the present Minnesota varieties. Both are early maturing, resistant to the smuts, crown rust, stem rust including race 8, and a new disease (*Helminthosporium* 96). Both have very stiff straws and have yielded more than either Vicland or Tama.

There are a few other varieties of oats that should be mentioned. Ajax is not a new variety but there seems to be a renewed interest in it. It was developed in Canada and is an early, white, high yielding variety. It is susceptible to crown rust, smuts and halo blight. It has yielded very good for the past two years because rust has not been severe. Benton is another variety that has been developed at Iowa and is a sister-selection of Clinton. It is very similar to Clinton and it has a slightly larger straw than the former. In yield, it is slightly lower than Clinton. Forvic is a new variety which has been developed at the Wisconsin Experiment Station and is very similar to Vicland in yield and resistance to diseases. It is susceptible to Race 8 stem rust and *Helminthosporium* 96. The limiting factor with all these new varieties will be the small amount of seed available.

There are a few new varieties of flax that may be available in limited amounts this coming spring. Dakota is a brown-seeded variety developed by the North Dakota Experiment Station. It has good yielding ability, rust resistant, and oil of good quality but the oil percentage is somewhat low. Sheyenne is an early brown-seeded variety of flax developed at the North Dakota Experiment Station. It has good resistance to rust and moderately good resistance to pasmo and wilt diseases. It has only a moderate yielding ability.

An attendance of more than 500 parents, ideal weather, an excellent dinner, and a good student program combined to make the 1946 Parents' Day on November 9 a great success.

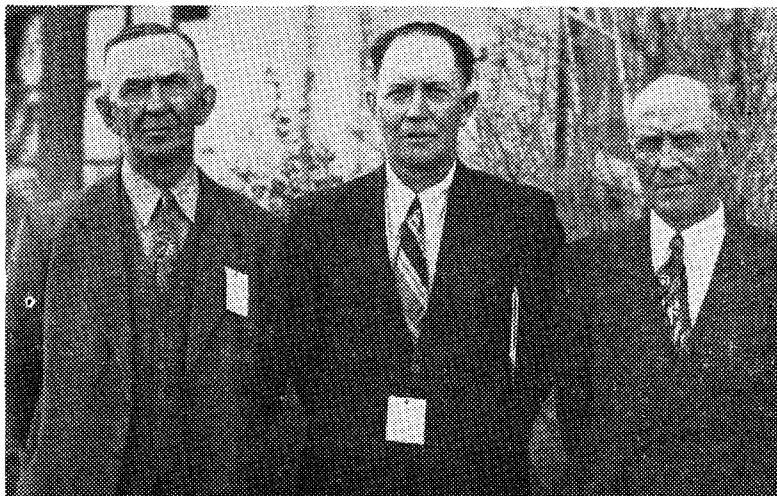

The Northwest Aggie runners wound up a good but unusual season on Saturday, November 2, at Grand Rapids in a triangular meet with the West Central School of Morris and North Central School of Grand Rapids for a Conference championship.
