## Dormitory Construction Progressing Slowly

Progress on the construction of the new dormitory for girls at the Northwest School has been slow. The work was practically at a standstill during the Christmas Holidays. The main job of plastering of walls has been completed; carpenters are now at work setting windows, putting on the finish trim, and hanging doors in the rooms. Major work left to be done in the dormitory includes the installation of the built-in wardrobes, study tables, lighting fixtures, the laying of the asphalt tile floors, and weather-stripping of windows. The foreman of construction on the dormitory has promised that the building will be completed before the date of dedication on February 27.

Dormitory equipment is on order with delivery expected as soon as the dormitory is completed.

Dr. J. L. Morrill, president of the University, and Dean C. H. Bailey of the Minnesota Experiment Station will speak on the dedication program. Committees from the Minnesota Legislature have been invited to attend the dedication ceremonies.

The detailed program for the dormitory dedication will be published in the February issue of the Northwest School News.

## School Enrollment Reaches 439 For Year

Twenty-five additional students enrolled at the Northwest School for the winter term making a registration for the year of 439. A number of students cancelled out at Christmas time; however, the "in school" attendance has remained over the 400 mark with 404 in actual attendance at the close of registration on January 6.

School dormitories are filled to capacity and all available rooms for students in Crookston are occupied. Housing facilities at the school and in the Crookston community have been inadequate to care for the number of students who sought admission. Classroom and laboratory space has not kept pace with the increased enrollment of students. Additional classrooms and laboratories for animal husbandry and poultry classes are urgently needed for 1947-48. The emergency dormitory ward in the Home Economics Building will again be available for home economics classes as soon as the new dormitory for girls can be occupied. The enrollment includes 110 girls and 294 boys. The Junior class ranks first in members with 114; other classes in order of enrollments are Seniors—105, Freshmen—101, Advanced—73, and Specials—11.

The prospective list of graduates for 1946-47, from the Senior and Advanced classes, will practically equal the high record of 178 set in the 1938 graduating classes.

## 144 Days Free From Frost In 1946

According to temperature readings at the Northwest School and Station, the warmest day of the year occurred on August 3, when the mercury rose to 100° and the coldest day with a temperature reading of -34° occurred on February 2. The year's mean temperature of 39.7° compares closely with the 36-year average of 39.16°. The six months of the growing season, April through September, were 2.2° below normal while the three winter months of January, February, and March were 13.3° above average. The greatest variation occurred in March which was 14.9° above normal. The fall months of October, November, and December were 4.2° below average for this same period.

The growing season for the past year, covering a period of 144 frost-free days from May 15 to October 7, was 13 days longer than the 16-year average period.

Other Conference games won included Central School of Agriculture at St. Paul, 28-23, and the North Central Aggies at Grand Rapids, 44-20. Return games in the Agricultural School Conference will be played with North Central at Crookston on February 1, West Central at Morris on February 14, and Central School at Crookston on February 21.

On January 15, the Aggies entertained a powerful Concordia College "B" team, losing 37-32. However, in losing to the Cobbers, the Aggies showed some of their best basketball form to date. # R. R. Valley Winter Shows, Feb. 24-28

The 1947 Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week at Crookston will be held during the week of February 24-28. T. M. McCall, president of the Winter Shows, states "Reports from the superintendents of the livestock and crops shows indicate that the livestock barns will be filled to capacity and the crops show will be larger than usual." O. M. Kiser, secretary of the Red River Valley Livestock Association, reports that herds and flocks from all the leading livestock breeders of the Valley will be in competition at the 1947 Show. Glen J. Johnson, district 4-H club supervisor, St. Paul, states "The liberal cash prizes offered in the 4-H club livestock and crops shows should bring out a record number of exhibitors in *the 4-H Club Departments.*" O. C. Soine, superintendent of the Farm Crops Department, states "The new floor space allotted the crops show on the second floor of the pavilion will be filled with high quality exhibits this year." Paul Engelstad of Thief River Falls, general superintendent of concessions and the livestock show reports, "New alterations in the livestock pavilion will give added room for industrial exhibits and give a balance to the show we have been seeking for a number of years." Harold Thomforde of Crookston, secretary of the Northern Minnesota Poultry Association, states "The 1947 show of our Association cannot be a feature of the Winter Shows this year due to the ban on poultry shows because of the Newcastle disease. To date, the Poultry

Association has an unbroken record of forty annual shows."

A full schedule of educational meetings for farmers, homemakers, and 4-H club members will be carried on during the week. Speakers of national reputation have been secured for the evening meetings.

Livestock judging contests for schools of agriculture, high schools, and 4-H clubs, and crop judging contests for the schools of agriculture will be held on Monday, February 24. Tuesday, February 25, will feature the meetings of crops men and the Ninth District Horticultural Society. Wednesday, February 26, will be Livestock Day for men. Women's meetings will start on Wednesday and continue through Friday. Thursday's program on February 27 includes the dedication of the new dormitory for girls at the Northwest School, meeting of potato growers, the sale of purebred sheep and swine, and the recognition dinner for the Red River Valley Farmers and Homemakers and Honor Livestock Breeders. Friday, February 28, will be Soil Conservation Day, cattle sale day, and the closing day for the women's meetings.

Exhibitors of crops and livestock, in both open and 4-H club classes, should send their entries in advance to the proper departmental offices or superintendents at the Northwest School and Station, Crookston. Departmental superintendents are O. C. Soine, farm crops; O. C. Turnquist, horticultural crops; and O. M. Kiser, livestock.

## 1946 Precipitation Was Above 46-Year Average

The total precipitation at the Northwest School and Station for the year of 1946 (21.96 inches) was 2.15 inches above normal. June, with 5.41 inches of rainfall, was the highest month, while January with 0.45 inches showed the lowest monthly precipitation.

The month by month precipitation was rather abnormal but the amount recorded for the growing season, April through September, was 15.84 inches, 0.69 inches above the normal for this period. February had 1.17 inches above normal due to the heavy snowfall during the month. The following table gives the precipitation by months for 1946 as compared to the 46-year average.
