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Winter Shows Livestock Sales Set New Record Total

The Red River Valley Winter Shows closed February 28 with the largest consignment sale of purebred livestock in its history. The total sales were \$38,945.00 with beef cattle bringing a record \$25,855.00 for seventy-seven head. The average sale price of beef cattle was \$335.00.

Two beef animals hit the thousand dollar mark at the sale. A Hereford bull, Mischief Aster, was purchased by Gerald Ryan, East Grand Forks, for \$1,000 and was consigned by Baumgarten Hereford Farm, Durbin, North Dakota. L. A. Bergemann, Welcome, paid \$1,000 for a Hereford cow sold by Eddie Gronseth of Rothsay.

Fifteen Hereford bulls sold for a total of \$7,000.00, averaging \$466.00 each, the highest average in the sale. Twenty-two Hereford cows sold for \$7,845.00 with an average of \$356.00.

The top beef Shorthorn cow from the Eldak herd, Mayville, North Dakota, sold for \$300.00. The beef Shorthorn cows averaged \$241.25 at the sale. Beef Shorthorn bulls averaged \$296.00 each with the top animals being sold for \$350.00 each by the Eldak Farms.

Angus cows averaged \$271.00 each while the bulls went slightly higher for an average of \$280.00. The top bull was sold for \$375.00 by Dale Stark, Angus, to Henry Valthover, Red Lake Falls.

The Milking Shorthorn bulls brought an average sale price of \$210.00.

According to A. J. Dexter, agricultural development agent of the Northern Pacific Railway and sales manager of the livestock sales, the prices brought at the Red River Valley Livestock Association sale of registered sheep, swine and cattle were the highest in the history of the shows.

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"On-the-Job" Farm Training Classes To Be Held At Northwest School

The "On-the-Job" Farm Training Program will get underway at the Northwest School during the week of March 24, with between thirty and forty students enrolled. The Northwest School was designated as training center for the veterans of the Crookston area who do not have access to local "on-the-job" farm training.

Members of the present Northwest School staff will conduct the night sessions for the veterans and supervise the home project work on the farms of veterans. A full four-year course has been outlined for the veterans. Each veteran, however, will take as long a training term as his Veterans Training Entitlement allows.

The training program carried on by the school will be conducted under the joint direction of the University of Minnesota, the State Department of Education, and United States Veterans Administration. An advisory committee has been appointed to work with Superintendent T. M. McCall in checking compliance of veterans on the training program. The advisory committee consists of Veral Gibbons, Crookston, as chairman, and County Agent Carl Ash and Wm. Albright of Crookston, Otto Will of Beltrami, and Ben Strickler of Euclid.
