### Women's Camp Scheduled For June 16-19

Program plans for the 22nd Annual Northwest School Women's Camp are now complete. An attendance of 150 women "in residence" is expected. A large number of former camp members have now reserved their rooms.

Miss Retta Bede, home economics specialist, will again serve as camp leader; a number of resident members of the Northwest School faculty will assist with the lectures, handicraft and recreational classes. Specialists secured for lectures and demonstrations include Dr. Andrew Hustulid of the Division of Agricultural Engineering, University of Minnesota, who will speak on limitations and possibilities of home freezing units and remodeling and modernizing of kitchens and bathrooms; Mrs. John E. Crimmins of Minneapolis who will give lecture-demonstrations on new plastics for use of the homemaker and creative millinery. J. H. Sylvestre, a prominent attorney of Crookston, will discuss questions of importance to homemakers relating to wills (continued on page 4, col 3)

Emphasis will be placed again on the major projects in agriculture and homemaking. Instruction will also be offered to junior and adult leaders. The county club agents, as they select the club members from their counties to fill the quotas, are selecting the older boys and girls who can in turn give instruction to the younger club members after their training period at the Northwest School 4-H Club Week.

Mr. Glen J. Johnson, district 4-H club supervisor for Northwestern Minnesota, will serve as camp leader. Instructors in charge of the classes

Mrs. O. Kessler of the Kerr Glass Canning Company has been invited to take charge of the canning demonstration work.
