## THREE SPECIAL FIELD DAYS SCHEDULED AT NORTHWEST SCHOOL AND STATION

### Sheep Shearing Day

The first of three farm field days at the Northwest School and Station, scheduled for early summer, will be the Sheep Management and Sheep Shearing day on June 10.

The instructions and demonstration on that day were arranged primarily for the veterans enrolled in the On-the-Farm Training Program, at the Northwest School and nearby high schools offering veterans' farm training. Because of the wide-spread interest in the program, a general invitation has been extended to all farmers and others interested in sheep production. W. E. Morris of the Agricultural Extension Division, University Farm, St. Paul, will be assisted by O. M. Kiser and H. D. Fausch of the Northwest School in program arrangements. A professional sheep shearer will give instructions in sheep shearing.

The program starts at 9:00 A.M. Coffee and cream will be furnished all who bring picnic lunches.

### Weed Control Day

Weed Control Day, a cooperative state-wide project, has been scheduled at the Northwest School for Monday, July 12.

A series of large plots on which the various types of weed sprays have been used, both as pre-emergence and post-emergence sprays, will be labeled and open for inspection on that day. A large exhibit of the leading kinds of sprayers and spray equipment, spray chemicals, and weed control implements will be on display throughout the day.

Lectures, conducted tours, and motion pictures will be features of the day's program which will start at 10:00 A.M. and continue until late afternoon.

Weed Control Day will be given state-wide recognition with regional meetings at Crookston, Morris, Waseca, and Grand Rapids. The Farmer magazine of St. Paul is cooperating with the University of Minnesota in publicizing the regional weed days and arranging for the educational exhibits. T. H. Fenske, associate director of field operations, University of Minnesota, and K. Klein of The Farmer magazine, St. Paul, are in charge of the state-wide arrangements. O. C. Soine, agronomist, is directing the work in spraying tests at the Northwest School and Station.

### Crops and Soils Day, July 15

The annual Crops and Soils Day at the Northwest School will be held on Thursday, July 15, following the Weed Control day. It was deemed advisable to have two separate days to

do full justice to weed control and crop production.

The officers and county directors of the Red River Valley Crops and Soils Association will meet in the library at the Northwest School at 10:30 A.M. on Crops Day for their annual business meeting and election of officers.

A tour of the Swine Breeding Project will be the chief feature of the morning program for all farmers interested in livestock production. The swine tour will start at 11:00 A.M.

The crops program and tour of plots will be held during the afternoon starting at 1:30 P.M. Dr. Harold Macy and T. H. Fenske, associate directors of the Minnesota Experiment Station, and representatives of the Department of Agronomy, Plant Pathology, and Horticulture will assist O. C. Soine and B. C. Beresford of the Northwest Station on the open forum program and field tours.

These meetings on special field days are open to the public. Red River Valley farmers are invited to attend.

## 4-H Members From Fifteen Counties To Attend 4-H Club Week

A total quota of 1,000 boys and girls from fifteen Red River Valley counties has been set up for the forthcoming 4-H Club Week to be held at the Northwest School June 14-18. Glen J. Johnson, district 4-H club supervisor for Northwestern Minnesota, has set a quota of 500 club members for each of the two three-day camps. The objective of the 4-H club department is to have representatives from every 4-H club in the district at the Northwest School club week. The older members of the club are urged to attend the district camps and get project instruction which they in turn can transmit to their home clubs or clubs in their counties.

Superintendent T. M. McCall and Registrar E. N. Reiersgord will work with Mr. Johnson in the administration and supervision of the club camps. Miss Retta Bede will be general supervisor of the girls' dormitories and conduct demonstrations in protein cookery; Miss Julia Shea will be in charge of the Dining Hall.
