RED RIVER VALLEY WINTER SHOWS TO BE HELD FEBRUARY 21-25

The 39th Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' and Homemakers' Week will be held at Crookston on February 21-25, 1949. The Winter Shows, each year, has served as an agricultural barometer which has served to mark the progress made annually in agricultural development of the Red River Valley.

Distinct progress has been made through the four decades of the Winter Shows history in the development of crops and the improvement of livestock and poultry. High yielding, disease-resistant varieties of crops have been developed through the period. Better methods of controlling livestock and poultry diseases have been devised, and new breeds of livestock have been introduced. Better feeding and sanitation methods have been adopted which have been made the poultry industry big business in the farming picture.

From the history of past shows, from 1000 to 3000 persons will attend the meetings and shows daily. Committees from the Chamber of Commerce of Crookston, in cooperation with the hotels and Winter Shows Board of Managers, are solving the housing problems during the week by providing dormitory space for the 4-H club and junior exhibitors and the visiting teams and hotel rooms for speakers and exhibitors. The Housing Bureau, with a full-time clerk, has been organized to serve as a housing bureau through the week.

Programs of commanding interest have been arranged for each day during the week, February 21-25. Speakers of national fame have been secured for the three evening meetings of February 22, 23 and 24, with Congressman Walter Judd of Minneapolis as the main speaker on February 22; Dr. J. O. Christianson, University of Minnesota, will speak on Wednesday evening; and Dr. Daniel Posin, a famous atomic scientist from Fargo, will speak on Thursday evening.

The Winter Shows buildings and

armory will house the largest display of industrial exhibits to be seen anywhere in the mid-northwest. Sixty to eighty judging teams from high schools and schools of agriculture will participate in the program during the week.

Judging contests for farmers' clubs, 4-H clubs, students from the schools of agriculture and high schools will have their contests on Monday, February 21, followed by a recognition banquet in which the individual and team awards will be made. Soil conservation men, crops growers, garden and flower societies, and 4-H club members will have programs on Tuesday, February 22. On Wednesday, February 23, livestock men will have their day, 4-H club members will have their all-day program of demonstrations, radio speaking contest, and the women will start their series of afternoon programs. Thursday, February 24, will be potato day for the crops men, sales day for the swine, sheep and dairy cattle breeders, with special meetings for the women. Friday, the women will have their closing program of the week, and the livestock show will culminate with the beef cattle sale during the afternoon.

The major 4-H club activities during the week include livestock judging contests on February 21; exhibition of livestock for judging, February 22; dairy demonstrations, noonday luncheon at Elk's Club, meetings and radio speaking contest on February 23; livestock and poultry exhibition, February 24-25.

Associations which will hold their annual meetings during the week, or special luncheon sessions are: The Red River Valley Livestock Association Stockholders meeting, Monday, 1:30 P.M.; Crops and Soils Association noonday luncheon, Tuesday, February 22; Northern Minnesota Poultry Association luncheon meeting, Wednesday, February 23; livestock men's Dutch lunch, Wednesday, February 23; annual meeting of the directors of the Red River Valley Development Association and Recognition Banquet for Farmers and Homemakers on Thursday, February 24; dinner meeting of the Winter Shows Board of Managers, Friday, February 25.

A full program of music has been arranged for the week in which the municipal band of Crookston and music groups of students from the Northwest School and Crookston High School will participate.

Authorities To Appear On Livestock and Crops Programs

Leading authorities in their respective fields have been secured to appear on the crops and livestock programs during the Northwest School Farmers' and Homemakers' Week and Red River Valley Winter Shows, February 21-25.

Authorities in the fields of soil conservation and crop production will appear on the program Tuesday, February 22. State and district officials from the Soil Conservation Service from Minnesota and Eastern North Dakota will hold their annual conference on Tuesday morning and cooperate in the crops program on Tuesday afternoon.

On the crops program on Tuesday afternoon, February 22, Dr. C. O. Rost, chief of the Division of Soils, University of Minnesota, will discuss fertilizer requirements for soils of the Red River Valley; John H. Parker, secretary of the Midwest Barley Improvement Association, Milwaukee, will speak on the barley improvement program for the Northwest; Professor R. S. Dunham of the Division of Agronomy and Plant Genetics, University Farm, St. Paul, will discuss the control of weeds in crops by the use of chemicals; and Dr. O. C. Soine, agronomist of the Northwest School and Station, will give crop varietal recommendations for 1949.

The livestock day program, scheduled for February 23, will have as its main speaker, Dr. W. L. Boyd, chief of the Division of Veterinary Medicine, University of Minnesota, who will discuss the latest developments in the control of Bang's Disease. The other feature of the livestock day program will be the panel discussion on the outlook for livestock and poultry for 1949. Participants in the panel will be H. G. Zavoral, University Farm, St. Paul; W. E. Morris, University Farm, St. Paul; Dr. H. J. Sloan, Chief of the Division of Poultry Husbandry; R. M. Anderson, Division of Animal Husbandry; and O. M. Kiser, Northwest School and Station. A progress report on the feeding of potatoes to beef steers will be made by H. D. Fausch of the Northwest School and Station.

Potato growers of the Red River Valley will have their annual meeting on Thursday, February 24. Highlights of the program are a report on the new potato research program inaugurated in the Red River Valley by O. C. Turnquist of St. Paul; potato research laboratory at East Grand Forks by Wm. Case, secretary of the Red River Valley Potato Growers' Association; progress in the control of potato diseases will be reported by Dr. Carl J. Eide and R. C. Rose of University Farm, St. Paul.

The memorial plaque with the names of World War II veterans lost in service is being cast at the Flour City Ornamental Iron Company, Minneapolis, at the present time. The bronze tablet will be placed on the soldiers' and sailors' memorial granite monument at the school at some favorable date decided upon by the officers and directors of the Northwest School Alumni Association. An impressive memorial service will be arranged for the unveiling of the plaque.

From the estimated costs submitted for the making of the plaque and the placing of the plaque on the monument, it appears there will be some \$300 left of the Memorial Fund to apply on the Northwest School electric organ fund.
