15,000 Attend Red River Valley Winter Shows

The 39th annual Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week, held at Crookston on February 21-25, proved to be one of the best weeks in the history of the Red River Valley Winter Shows. Favorable weather, worthwhile programs, and exhibit space at a premium in all four Winter Shows buildings, all combined to attract large crowds of people to the meetings and shows each day. More than 15,000 were in attendance at the various meetings and shows during the five days of the shows.

An outstanding feature of the best livestock show in years was the exhibition of forty junior and senior heifer futurity calves. Exhibits in 4-H crop classes, open class competition in grain, livestock, potatoes, poultry, and rabbit shows, together with the educational and industrial exhibits, made the 1949 Winter Shows one of the best-balanced agricultural expositions in the entire midwest.

Radio stations of the Red River Valley area gave full cooperation in sending out Winter Shows news prior to and including Winter Shows week. Radio Station KROX of Crookston had programs originate daily at the Winter Shows buildings; Radio Station KILO of Grand Forks had a one-half hour program daily, and Station KTRF of Thief River Falls carried direct broadcasts on one day of the Winter Shows week.

Northwest School Debaters Share Honors With West Central

The Northwest School debating teams tied with West Central School of Agriculture, Morris, teams for honors in their annual dual debate which was held on March 8. The Northwest School's affirmative team met the West Central School negative team at the Northwest School auditorium, and the West Central School won the debate at Crookston. The negative team from the Northwest School journeyed to Morris where the Northwest School team won a unanimous decision of the judges from the West Central team.

McCall announces that ninety-six students will graduate from the Regular course and ninety-three students from the Advanced year. Dr. C. H. Bailey, dean and director of the College of Agriculture and Minnesota Experiment Station, University of Minnesota, will give the Commencement address. Commencement exercises will be held at 2:00 P.M. on Friday, March 25.

Classes for the winter term officially close at 11:30 A.M. on Friday, March 25.

At present, he is chairman of the Minnesota Certified Seed Potato Advisory Board, North Central States Potato Committee on Marketing Agreements, and Advisory Board and Industrial Relations Center, University of Minnesota. His broad business experience, his leadership in school and religious matters, and his record in public service make him well-fitted for his new position as a University Regent.

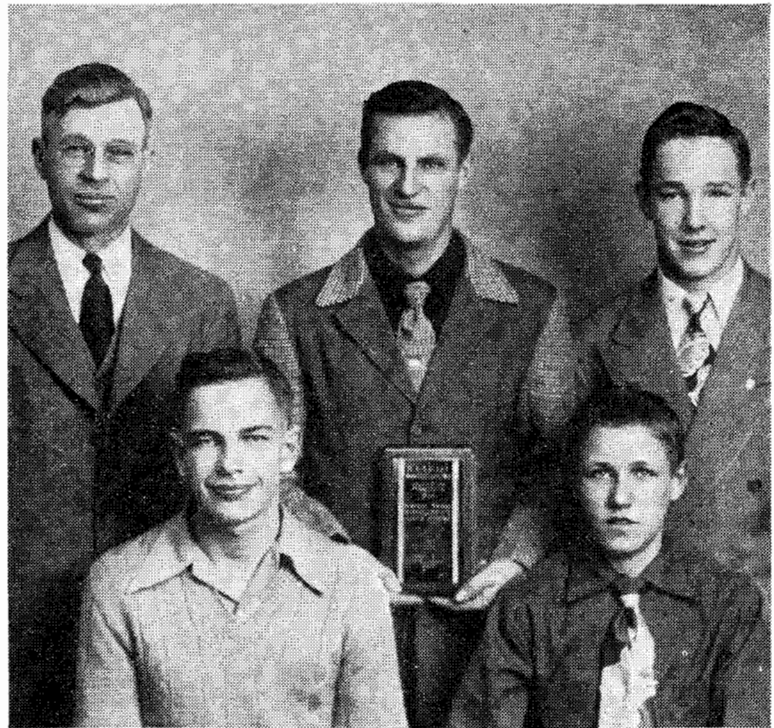
