## Parents' Day, November 22

Exhibits of crops, collection projects, sewing, and baking will be features of the Student Home Project Show to be held in the school gymnasium.

A student program for the parents will be held in the school auditorium at 1:30 P. M. More than one hundred girls will take part in the style revue in which they will model clothing made during the summer months. The following is a timely editorial which appeared in the student publication "The Aggie Rouser" of November 14 written by Alice M. Nordgaarden of Winger, a member of the class in Journalism at the Northwest School:

### 1950 Football Summary

In spite of a slow start due to late threshing operations, fall work, and early season injuries, a group of young, hardworking Northwest School Aggie boys molded themselves into a well-balanced football team that played clean, smart, hard-hitting football. Even though only one regular reported back, Captain Teddy Zumbusch, competition for regular positions on the team was unusually keen. This 1950 Aggie football team was one of the hardest hitting and tackling teams to ever represent the school. By the time they played their last game against Warren, their offensive play was as near perfect as we could ever hope for.

After only a week of school, the Aggies defeated a fighting Fertile aggregation in a 6 to 0 thriller, with the game in doubt until the final whistle. Three quarters of this game was played in a rain storm. The following week found the Aggies dropping a 12 to 6 game to Waubun who, incidentally, finished the season undefeated. Their winning touchdown came in the final minute of the game by a long suicide pass play. After this game, the Aggie offense started to improve with each practice. In their third game, the Northwest School Aggies defeated the Grand Rapids Aggies 26 to 7 to dampen the enthusiasm of the North Central Homecoming crowd. This game found the Aggies doing everything right which was fortunate because the Grand Rapids team was a veteran aggregation and intact from the year before during which they went undefeated.

The biggest blow to the Aggie schedule was a 12 to 6 defeat at the hands of a fighting Morris Aggie team. Even though this game was played before a large Homecoming crowd in shirtsleeve weather, the pressure was a little too much for the young Northwest School boys. The result was that they fumbled ten times in this game which kept them in the hole most of the game. A sustained seventy-five yard march in the final quarter failed to reach the goal by just inches!

The final game was played November 1 under the floodlights on the Warren gridiron. This was by far the best exhibition of football shown by any Aggie team in recent years. Two full busloads of Aggie rooters helped cheer the boys on even though it was played in freezing weather. The Warren team was nicely coached, using tricky offense built around their powerful fullback, Nowachi. Even though Warren's thirteen first downs equalled the Aggie number, the Warren team couldn't stop the Aggie running and passing attack. The final score of this game was 46 to 7 in favor of the Aggies.

Taking everything into consideration, the boys deserve a lot of credit for the rapid improvement shown this year; changing from an inexperienced green team to a team that played like professionals. Nice going boys!
