40th Annual Northwest School Farmers' Week And Red River Valley Winter Shows, February 19-23

The annual Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' and Homemakers' Week will be held at Crookston on February 19-23. The program and schedule of events for the week will be under the direction of the Winter Shows Board of Managers. Two of the three evening speakers have been secured and judging schedules and day programs have been arranged, according to T. M. McCall, president of the Board of Managers.

John Brandt, president of Land O' Lakes, Inc., an outstanding agricultural leader, will discuss his plans for an agricultural program on the evening of Wednesday, February 21. On the evening of Thursday, February 22, Dr. A. A. Dowell of St. Paul, formerly superintendent of the Northwest School and Station and former president of the Red River Valley Winter Shows, will give his impressions on European and southern Asian agricultural conditions. Mrs. Dowell will address the women's meetings during the afternoon of February 22.

A new feature of the Crops Show this year, approved by the Red River Valley Development Association, will be a full line of small grain crops in the 4-H crops show. The Pillsbury State Contest for both spring and Durum wheats will again be held in connection with the Winter Crops Show.

The premium list for small grains has been revised and brought up-to-date to recognize the new and standard varieties of grain crops, legumes, and potatoes. A larger than average crop show is being anticipated due to the keen interest in and demand for new and disease-immune varieties of small grains and potatoes.

The Heifer Futurity will again be an outstanding feature of the livestock show. Orville Eng of Ada, secretary of the Futurity committee, announces that 85 animals have already been entered in the Junior, Senior, and Advanced Heifer Futurity and Futurities in sheep and swine. A full representation of breeds of cattle, sheep and swine is expected in the open class of the livestock show, according to O. M. Kiser, secretary of the Red River Valley Livestock Association. The judging of open class and Junior Futurity classes will start on Tuesday, February 20, and open class judging will continue in livestock classes through Wednesday. The final contests in Junior showmanship will be held on Thursday morning, February 22, with all herd and flock trophies awarded at that time.

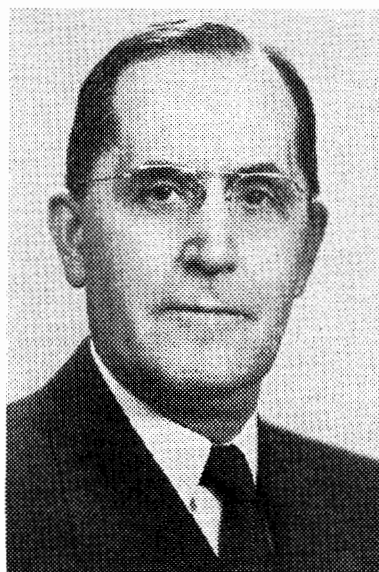
The Crops Day program will be held on Tuesday, February 20. The Soil Conservation districts will have their meeting on Monday afternoon, February 19.

Livestock Day has been set for Wednesday, February 21. Livestock breeding, feeding and dairy herd management will be the chief themes discussed at the afternoon program. The Dutch lunch for livestock breeders and livestock sales consignors will be held the evening of livestock day.

Potato growers will gather for their annual program on Thursday, February 22. Production problems and marketing with government restrictions removed will be the timely subjects considered by outstanding authorities in the fields of potato production and marketing.

Livestock sales will be held on Thursday, February 22, for bred ewes and gilts, and on Friday, February 23, for beef and dairy cattle. More than 120 head of purebred livestock from the best herds of the Red River Valley will be sold at the two-day sales.

Space in the poultry building will be at a premium, according to Harold Thomforde, secretary of the poultry show. The Northern Minnesota Poultry Association is planning for a special turkey program for Wednesday, February 21, following the completion of the judging.

Mrs. A. A. Dowell, wife of Dr. A. A. Dowell, former superintendent of the Northwest School and Station and former president of the Winter Shows Board of Managers, will speak on the program at the Red River Valley Winter Shows on Thursday afternoon, February 22. Dr. Dowell will be the speaker on the evening program of February 22.

Dr. and Mrs. Dowell returned to the United States from a six-months leave of absence on the last of September. The leave of Dr. Dowell, from his position as professor in agricultural economics in the College of Agriculture, University of Minnesota, St. Paul, was to study land and agricultural marketing problems of Western Europe, Italy, and India.

Mrs. Dowell will give an illustrated talk on her observations in Europe. Dr. Dowell will give an illustrated talk on his observations in India. Dr. Dowell, a leading authority in Agricultural Economics in the Northwest, is well known in the Red River Valley for his ten years' residence at the Northwest School, 1927-37, and for his research in land values and livestock marketing.

The Red River Valley Crops and Soils Association will have a luncheon meeting on Crops Day, February 20. On February 21, the Northern Minnesota Poultry Association will have a noon luncheon as a feature of their Turkey Day program. Other organizations meeting on February 21 include the directors of the Red River Valley Dairymen's Association, Adult Youth Group, annual Dutch lunch meeting of livestock breeders and 4-H club state and county leaders.

Regional Fertilizer Dealers Conference Held at School

450 fertilizer dealers and large users of fertilizers attended the first Regional Conference of Fertilizer Dealers at the Northwest School of Agriculture on January 4. All of the Red River Valley counties were represented at the conference.

Speakers on the program included Dr. C. O. Rost, chief of the division of Soils, University Farm, St. Paul; Paul Burson, director of the Soils Testing Laboratory, University Farm, St. Paul; and Harold Jones, Extension Soils Specialist, also from University Farm, St. Paul; and O. C. Soine and Superintendent T. M. McCall from the Northwest School and Station.

The soils and fertilizer requirements of the Red River Valley soil types, fertilizer grades and ratios, and organic matter in the soils were the chief topics discussed during the regional conference.

Fertilizer dealers at the meeting voted to make the regional conference an annual affair.

A. R. Miesen, agricultural development agent of the Northern Pacific Railway Company, St. Paul, was the chairman of the committee on arrangements for the meeting.
