## Livestock Association Plans For Winter Shows, February 18-22, 1952

The fall meeting of the Red River Valley Livestock Association directors and advisory board members was held in Crookston on October 31. Plans were made at the meeting for the livestock show and sale and other livestock activities at the forthcoming Red River Valley Winter Shows at Crookston, February 18-22, 1952.

Superintendents of the various departments in the livestock show were named; superintendents for the 1952 show are: Paul Engelstad of Thief River Falls, general superintendent of livestock show and concessions; Carl G. Ash of Crookston, superintendent of livestock; J. E. Wilder of Crookston, superintendent of exhibition admissions; Howard Balk of Bagley, superintendent of cattle; Ray Mitteness of Thief River Falls, assistant superintendent of cattle; Frank Forbes of Warren, superintendent of swine with Harold Rosendahl of Ada as assistant superintendent; Oscar Nelson of Mahanomen, superintendent of sheep with Charles Campbell of Hallock as assistant superintendent.

An inside improvement planned for the Livestock Association building includes the rearrangement of the judging arena for swine. A new lounge room for women is also planned.

The date for the annual sale of cattle was changed from Friday, February 22, to Thursday, February 21. The sale of swine and sheep will be held on February 22. Freddie Chandler, auctioneer of Chariton, Iowa, will return for the cattle sale on February 21.

The Futurity Committee of the Livestock Association reported that a number of shares of stock in the Red River Valley Livestock Association have been given to the committee by stockholders to be awarded as memberships to outstanding exhibitors in the Futurity contest. Livestock breeders of the Valley also will be consigning outstanding heifer calves, gilts and lambs to be sold as a separate feature of the livestock sales to Futurity or prospective Futurity members only.

## Northwest Aggies 1951 Conference Champions in Football

Two coveted football trophies repose in the Northwest School's trophy case indicative of the 1951 Agricultural School Conference Championship.

"Ossie" the pig was brought back from Morris after the November 2 game with the West Central School. The "little brown jug" trophy to the winner of the North Central and Northwest Aggie Homecoming game was retained at the Northwest School.

Thirty-one Aggie gridders are slated to receive football letters at an athletic Awards Assembly at the Northwest School next month.

Names of the thirty-one, including fourteen seniors, fourteen juniors and three sophomores, will be submitted by Coach Herschel Lysaker to a faculty committee for approval. The letters will be awarded on the basis of scholarship and school activities as well as athletic achievement.

The players are members of the Aggie squad that came within one point of an undefeated season this fall. They won five games and lost one, amassing 126 points to 31 for their opponents. Best games were the Homecoming rout of Grand Rapids, the 34-0 defeat of a Waubun team primed for victory, and the triumph over Morris on an ice-coated field in 12-degree temperature.

Northwest School has one of the shortest seasons of any team in this area, extending this year from October 6 to November 2. To offset their late start, they had a squad of forty this year with a depth of two or three players at every position. They were able to wear down opposition with a platoon system using thirty or more players in every game.

The 12-13 defeat at Fosston came with several key players absent while attending the Junior Livestock Show in South St. Paul. The Aggies blew a two-touchdown lead late in the second half.

Northwest School had a hefty team this year, with a line averaging 185 pounds, including reserves, and a backfield weighing in at an average of 155.

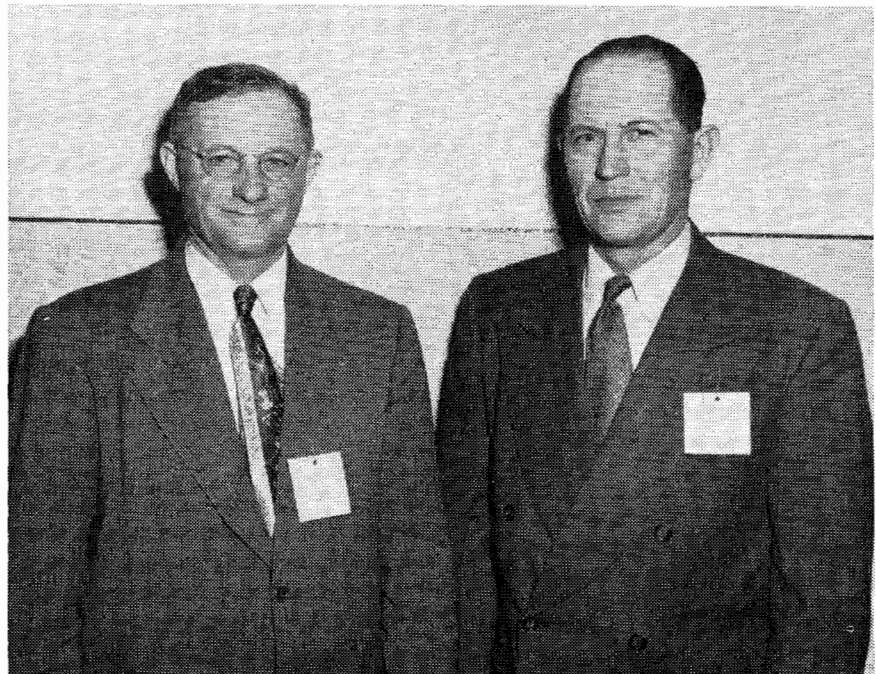
Dr. Odland has been an official judge of All-American selection of vegetables since 1945.
