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"Aggie" Receives All-American Rating

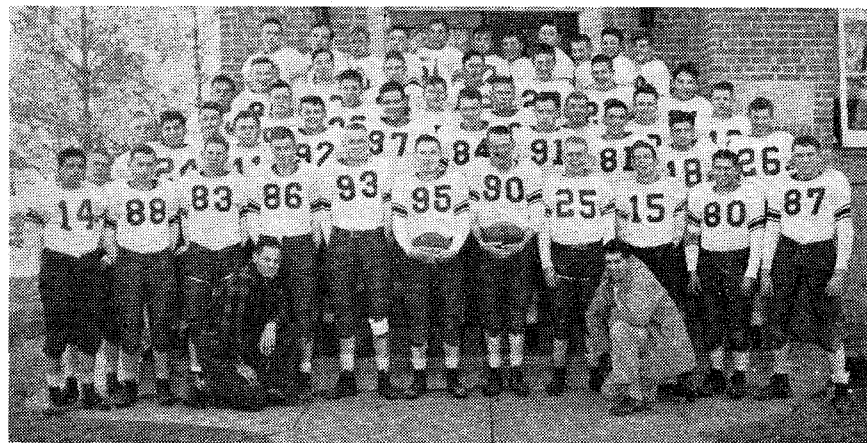

Manufacturing Company Of Alumnus Adopts Employee Benefit Plan

Northwest School alumni and friends of Ebenhard Gandrud, class '26, were pleased to note the advanced step taken by the E. S. Gandrud Company in employer-employee relations. An announcement was made on October 10 of the adoption of an employee profit-sharing plan for the seventy-five employees of the E. S. Gandrud Company of Owatonna, Minnesota, of which Ebenhard Gandrud is president.

Mr. Gandrud states, "The profit-sharing plan has been evolved to give employees generous retirement benefits while at the same time employees are dis-associated with any risk of management while being a part of the company. Benefits are not linked in any way, and are in addition to Social Security benefits. Profit-sharing funds are disbursed to employees (a) upon reaching retirement age, (b) in event of emergency, (c) at death, (d) when leaving the firm."

Superintendent T. M. McCall states, "The faculty at the Northwest School join me in extending congratulations to Ebenhard Gandrud and his company for this advanced step in giving employees benefits of profits without suffering risks of management."

Turkey Day Program Has Good Attendance

Turkey growers of the Red River Valley observed Turkey Day at the Northwest School and Experiment Station on October 30.

The results of feeding trials with turkeys, over the three-year period of 1950-52, were summarized and distributed at the Turkey Day program. Dr. H. J. Sloan, chief of the Division of Poultry Husbandry, University Farm, St. Paul, spoke on the subject Feeding Breeding Flocks and Growing Turkeys. Experience in Breeding Turkeys for Better Performance was discussed by Dr. Robert Shoffner, also from the Poultry Division at University Farm; and Dr. B. S. Pomeroy of the Division of Veterinary Medicine, University Farm, St. Paul, specialist in poultry diseases, discussed Turkey Diseases and Modern Methods of Combatting Them.

A. M. Pilkey, poultry husbandman at the Northwest School and Experiment Station, conducted the tour of the Turkey Feeding Trials and gave the results of the turkey feeding rations on the production of market turkeys. Four lots of 100 turkeys each have been used in the feeding trials each year, with four lots of 50 turkeys each used in the Blackhead Control project.

Northwest Aggies End Successful Football Season

The Northwest School football team completed one of its best seasons with regards to schedule, improvement with each succeeding game, and percentage of victories over losses. The squad this year, starting with four boys as a nucleus who were regulars on last year's Conference champions, rapidly developed into a gridiron machine that was a scoring threat on almost every play. The Aggies played a wide open game using the split "T" offense plus a mixture of short punt and single wing plays.

When the season opened, the team had time to concentrate only on offense before its first game; and, as a result, the defensive play suffered so much that the first game was lost. After another week of practice, the team rolled to six successive victories amassing 256 points to 56 for their opponents. In all of the games this year, 35 to 41 boys saw action. The squad of 76 boys out for football came from 33 communities in Northwestern Minnesota.

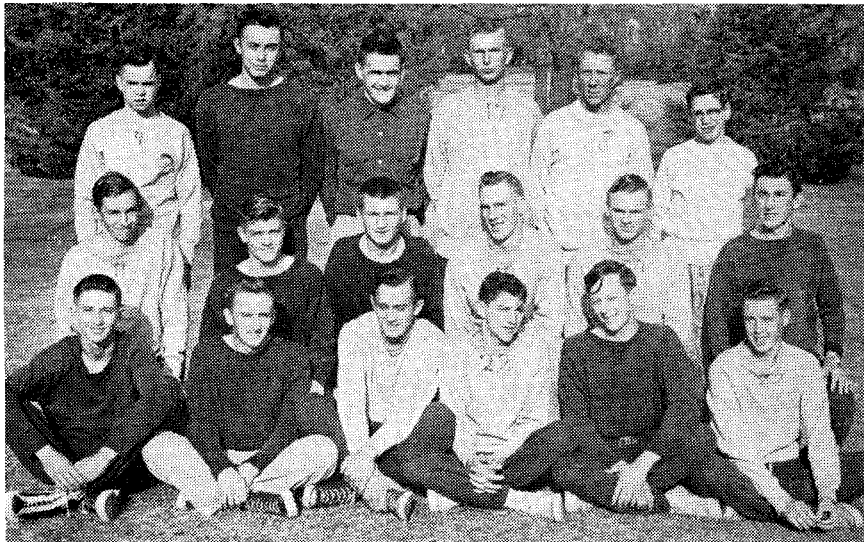
