16,000 Attend Winter Shows

The 44th annual Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week, Crookston, was a great success. The show buildings were crowded daily for a near-record attendance. More than 14,000 persons passed through the gates which, together with more than 2,000 taking part in educational meetings, judging contests, demonstrations, and exhibitions, made a total attendance of more than 16,000 for the week of February 22-26.

With temperatures around 32° above each day, the weather was very satisfactory. Snow flurries on Monday and late Thursday evening did not interfere with the program or attendance.

The various contests, judging of crops, livestock and poultry, were conducted according to schedule. Daily programs, Monday through Thursday, for men, women and 4-H club members were well attended. The educational program featured special days for soil conservation, crops, garden clubs, livestock producers, potato and sugar beet growers, and women's meetings.

Two very satisfactory livestock sales were held during Winter Shows week.

A grand total of \$34,840 was paid for 200 head of livestock—dairy and beef cattle, sheep and hogs—during sales Thursday and Friday. This total included 68 hogs, bringing a total of \$9,790; 49 sheep, \$2,740; 25 dairy cattle, \$5,340; and 58 beef cattle, \$16,970.

Hog prices were up over last year. Prices of livestock on the open market were reflected in the downward trend on cattle and sheep as was to be expected. Top prices on beef cattle, while lower than in 1953, were \$670 for a Hereford bull and \$500 for a Hereford cow. The two top dairy cows in the sale sold for \$350 each.

The 1954 sale of livestock brought to the farmers of the Red River Valley an excellent opportunity to get into purebred livestock business at rock-bottom prices.

Miss Elsie Kingston Passed Away February 25

Miss Elsie Mae Kingston, a former instructor who returned to manage the Northwest School dining Hall in 1952, passed away at a local hospital on February 25.

Miss Kingston, although not well for the past six months, continued in active management of her work as principal food service supervisor and instructor until the time of her death.

She was born at Allen, Nebraska, on May 9, 1905. Her subcollegiate training was taken at the Wayne, Nebraska, public schools and her undergraduate training in home economics at Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa, where she graduated in 1929.

In the fall of 1929 she began her work at the Northwest School as an instructor in home economics and continued through 1943 when she resigned to care for an invalid mother.

Following her mother's death, she served as principal and instructor in the public schools of Climbing Hill, Iowa, 1944 to 1947. She then became owner and joint manager of a restaurant at Beresford, South Dakota, and continued there until 1951. In returning to her chosen field of teaching in 1951-52, she taught one year at Lakefield, Minnesota, before returning to the Northwest School in 1952.

Funeral services were held in Crookston on Saturday morning, February 27, at the Houske Funeral home; final services, however, were held at Wayne, Nebraska, on March 2. Miss Mary Croal and Miss Patricia Harman of the Northwest School faculty furnished the music at the Crookston memorial service. Miss Croal played the organ prelude and Miss Harman sang two numbers.

Honorary pallbearers were Superintendent T. M. McCall, A. M. Foker O. M. Kiser, A. M. Pilkey, George Hillman and Juel Torvi.

At a brief memorial service for Miss Kingston, held at the school assembly on March 3, Superintendent T. M. McCall paid tribute to her for her unselfish devotion to her task and those with whom she came in contact.

Mrs. David Hilyard of Mitchell, Nebraska, a sister of Miss Kingston, is the only surviving member of the Kingston family.

School Judging Teams Win High Honors

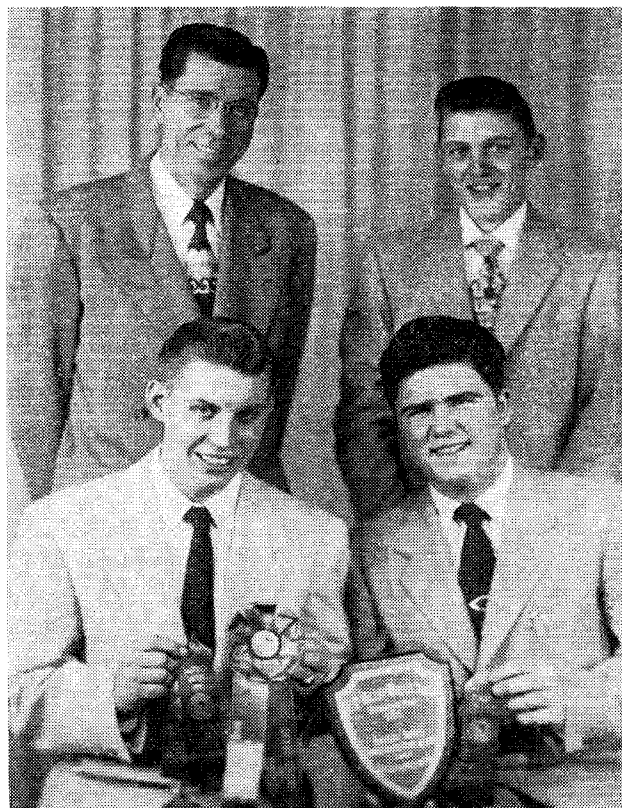
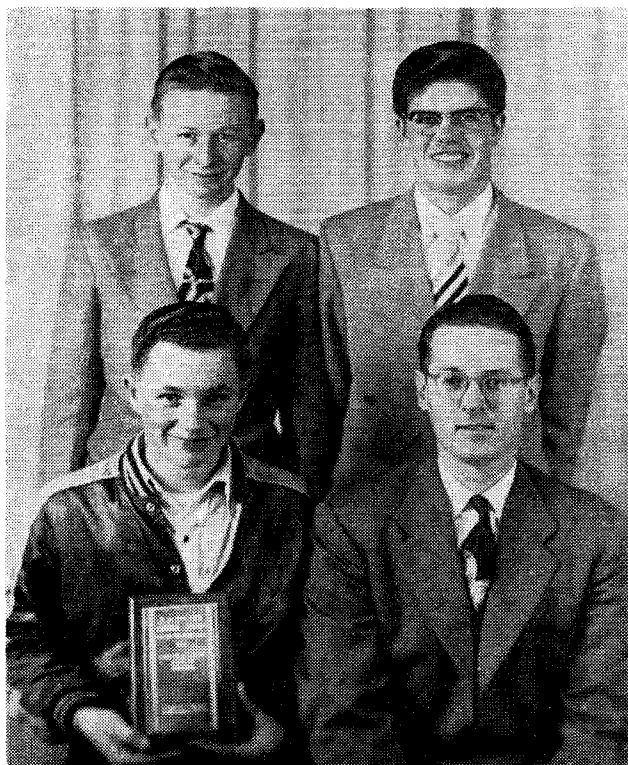
The livestock and potato judging teams from the Northwest School of Agriculture won top honors in the annual subcollegiate judging contests held on February 22 at the Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week, Crookston. Second place was won by the Northwest School crops judging team and a \$30 cash award in an international contest.

In the subcollegiate livestock judging contest, the Northwest School team won over teams from Minnesota, North and South Dakota. The team from West Central School, Morris, ranked second in general livestock judging and first in dairy judging. Members of the livestock judging team from the Northwest School were: David Boman and Neal Bjornson of Arvilla, N. Dak., and Arthur Grothman, Blanchard, N. Dak. David Boman, high man in the contest, was also high man in beef cattle judging. Arthur Grothmann ranked third in total points; the team ranked second in dairy cattle judging. R. M. Stolen coached the livestock judging team.

The members of the winning potato judging team were Elmer Halstensgaard, Bejou; John Welberg, Baudette, and Wesley Motschenbacher, Sabin. The team was coached by B. C. Beresford.

This year, the interstate subcollegiate crops judging contest became international in scope with a team from the Diploma Course of the University of Manitoba, Winnipeg, Canada, competing for the first time. Other teams competing this year were teams from Schools of Agriculture at Crookston, Morris and Grand Rapids, Minnesota; Brookings, South Dakota, and Park River, North Dakota. The Northwest School crops judging team was coached by O. C. Soine and the team was composed of Clinton Balstad, Winger; Donald Taus, Angus; and Harvey Halstensgaard, Gary.
