## 47TH ANNUAL NORTHWEST SCHOOL FARMERS' WEEK AND RED RIVER VALLEY WINTER SHOWS TO BE HELD FEB. 25-MAR. 1

The forty-seventh annual Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week will be held in Crookston from February 25 through March 1. The meetings and shows are sponsored jointly by the University of Minnesota through the Northwest School and Experiment Station and numerous cooperating agricultural organizations of the Red River Valley area. This event has an annual attendance of from 14,000 to 17,000 persons.

All daytime educational meetings are free and open to the public; the small admission charge to the shows enables the visitor to attend the night meetings for the price of an all-day ticket.

Judging contests continue to be an outstanding educational feature of the Winter Shows. Judging contests start Monday, February 25, with livestock judging contests for 4-H, Farmers' Club and Veterans, and Schools of Agriculture teams. Crops judging and potato judging contests on the opening day are held for F. F. A. High School teams as well as School of Agriculture teams. A 4-H Grain Clinic and Crops Judging contest will be held on Wednesday, February 27. The banquet for crops judging and livestock judging contestants will be held on Monday evening, at 5:45 o'clock.

Tuesday, February 26, will be Crops Day and Ninth District Horticultural Society Day. An interesting crops program will be held at 1:30 p. m. in the Crookston High School auditorium, and the Ninth District Horticultural Society (garden club) program will be held at 1:30 p. m. in the First Methodist Church. The banquet for Futurity members will be held on Tuesday evening, at 5:45 o'clock.

On Wednesday, February 27, the Livestock Day program will be held in the Crookston High School auditorium at 1:30 p. m. A special 4-H program will be held on Wednesday, as well as the "smorgasbord" dinner and meeting of livestock breeders. The Red River Valley Spelling Contest will be held at 9:30 a. m. on Wednesday.

The theme of the Thursday, February 28, daytime meeting will be "Use of Airplanes in Agriculture." This meeting will be held in the Crookston High School auditorium at 2:00 p. m. The Flying Farmers banquet will be held at 6:00 p. m. on this day, also. On Thursday, at 5:30 p. m., the "recognition" banquet for honored 1957 Valley Farmers and Homemakers will be held in the dining room of the Dining Hall Building at the Northwest School.

The evening meetings, to be held in the Crookston High School auditorium, will be highlighted with addresses by well-known speakers. On Tuesday evening, February 26, Dr. J. William Buchta, professor of Physics and associate dean of the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts, University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, will speak on "Peacetime Possibilities of Atomic Energy." George Grim, newspaper columnist, world traveler, and TV and radio news commentator, will speak on Wednesday evening, February 27. His talk, "One Man's Russia," will give an account of his trip to Russia in 1956. For the Thursday evening, February 28, meeting, Dr. Joseph L. Knutson, president of Concordia College, Moorhead, will speak on "Education in the United States—Strengths and Weakness."

The livestock sales will be held in the livestock pavilion on Thursday, February 28, and Friday, March 1. The sale on Thursday includes bred ewes and gilts; the Friday cattle sale will include the sale of both beef and dairy cattle.

The 4-H club activities begin on Monday afternoon with a radio speaking contest at 1:45 p. m. The judging of Futurity livestock will be held on Tuesday, and the 4-H dairy demonstrations will start on Tuesday and continue through Wednesday. 4-H activities will culminate on Wednesday with a general program for 4-H club members during the afternoon.

## Commencement Exercises To Be Held March 29

The winter term at the Northwest School of Agriculture opened on January 7 with an overflowing enrollment of 402 students. This enrollment was down somewhat from the fall term; twelve students have dropped out since the opening date of the fall term. The enrollment is divided among 77 boys and 20 girls among the Freshmen, 77 boys and 12 girls among the Sophomores, 87 boys and 19 girls among the Juniors, and 97 boys and 13 girls among the Seniors.

Commencement exercises have been set for March 29 at 2:00 p.m. At this writing, it appears that 110 Seniors will be awarded diplomas. Baccalaureate exercises will be held on Sunday evening, March 24, at 8:00 o'clock.

Dr. Martelle Cushman, dean of the College of Education, University of North Dakota, will be the Commencement speaker. Choral groups from the Northwest School will provide music.

### Beef Feeding Trial At NW Station, 1956-57

The 1956-57 beef cattle feeding trial at the Northwest School and Experiment Station, Crookston, began on November 14, 1956. Four lots of six steers each, weighing an average of 726 pounds, will be fed out to about 1050 lbs. weight on four different rations. The two major aspects of cattle feeding that are being emphasized this year are: the pelleting of grain versus ground grain, and the value of feeding stilbestrol with pelleted grain and with ground grain. This experimental trial is, in part, a repeat of last year's beef feeding work at the Northwest Experiment Station. The results last year indicated very definite advantages in favor of pelleting the grain mixture and including stilbestrol in the ration.

The beef feeding trial this year is being conducted to check on the favorable results obtained previously at the Northwest Experiment Station.

The daily rations per steer are as follows:

Lot I (Control Group): Alfalfa hay and ground grain free choice. One pound of soybean meal per steer daily.

Lot II: Alfalfa hay and ground grain free choice. One pound of soybean meal with 11 mgms. stilbestrol per steer daily.

Lot III: Alfalfa hay and pelleted grain free choice. One pound of soybean meal per steer daily.

Lot IV: Alfalfa hay and pelleted grain free choice. One pound of soybean meal with 11 mgms. stilbestrol per steer daily.

The grain ration for all four lots is composed of 70 per cent barley and 30 per cent oats. Stilbestrol was incorporated into the protein concentrate at the rate of 11 milligrams per pound of soybean meal. It is expected that the trial will run for about 140 days, and will provide feeding comparisons in six different respects, namely:

(a) The value of feeding stilbestrol with a ground grain ration. (Lots I and II).

(b) The value of feeding stilbestrol with a pelleted grain ration. (Lots III and IV).

(c) The value of feeding pelleted grain versus ground grain with stilbestrol in both rations. (Lots II and IV).

(d) The value of feeding pelleted grain versus ground grain with no stilbestrol in either rations. (Lots I and III).

(e) The value of feeding ground grain with stilbestrol versus pelleted grain without stilbestrol. (Lots II and III).

(f) The value of feeding ground grain without stilbestrol versus feeding pelleted grain with stilbestrol. (Lots I and IV).

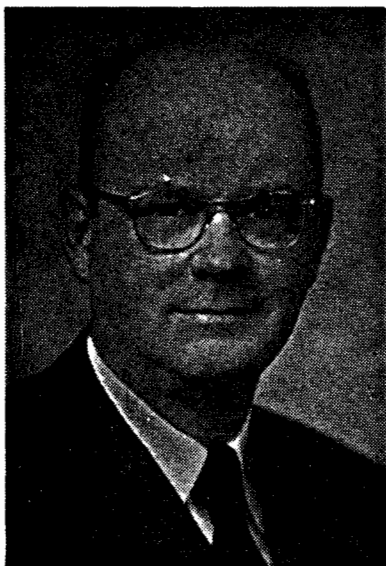
## Students Presented Awards; Team Captains Elected
