## Turkeymen Invited To Turkey Day, November 15

The eighth annual Turkey Day will be held on Friday, November 15, at the Northwest School and Experiment Station. The program for the day will feature the reports on the 1957 turkey work. Twenty-five different arrangements of feeding, including fifteen restricted feeding programs and five all-mash pellet arrangements, and three methods of feeding high quality grass ensilage is now under test. On Turkey Day, this will be reported on as will the continuation of research to find a satisfactory cure for the disease of Blackhead for which the industry and scientists have searched for over a half century. A new drug, known as N. F. 256, is under test as well as continuous research using N. F. 180 and N. F. Z.

## SWINE FEEDING TRIALS SCHEDULED FOR NORTHWEST EXPERIMENT STATION

Swine nutrition will be given special attention in the first of a new series of annual swine feeding trials to be initiated at the Northwest School and Experiment Station, Crookston, in September, 1957. The main areas of investigation will be concerned with the relative feeding values of basal corn and barley rations in both the ground and pelleted forms.

The 1957 feeding trial has been set up to evaluate eight different swine feeding formulae. The control lot will be fed a basal corn ration, whereas the remaining seven lots will receive various forms of ground and pelleted basal barley rations. Listed below are the various rations to be fed:

The rations for lots 6, 7 and 8 will be identical to those of lots 3, 4 and 5, respectively, with the exception that the former group will be fed pellets and the latter group will be fed ground grain. All rations will contain trace mineralized, high zinc salt, and will be fortified with adequate amounts of vitamin A, vitamin D, the B complex vitamins and with antibiotics.

The final evaluation of these rations will be determined by the data to be assembled on daily rate of gain, feed efficiency, and carcass grade and quality, as well as the cost data on returns over feed costs. These are the factors most important in any livestock feeding program as they will largely determine the financial success or failure of the farmers efforts in the feedlot.

Crossbred pigs sired by Minn. 2a and Minn. 3 boars and out of Minn. 2 sows will be used in the feeding trial. A minimum of fourteen pigs will be assigned to each lot when weaned at six weeks, or when about 40 pounds in weight. Equal numbers of barrows and gilts from each breeding group will be represented in each lot. It is expected that the pigs will be on feed for approximately 14 weeks until they reach market weight of about 200 pounds.

The Minn. No. 2 breed of swine was developed at the Northwest Experiment Station by Dr. L. M. Winters of the University of Minnesota. The breed rests on a foundation of Canadian Yorkshire by inbred Poland China cross, and was designed to complement the Minn. No. 1 in crossing for the production of market hogs. The Minn. No. 3 breed, also developed by Dr. Winters, was designed to fit into a crossing program utilizing all three of the Minnesota inbred breeds of swine. The breed was started in 1954 from foundation stock consisting of Gloucester Old Spot, Large White and Welsh boars imported from England, the USDA Beltsville No. 2 hogs, inbred Poland China, and San Pierre, together with a small contribution from the Minn. No. 1 and 2. Crossing tests conducted during recent years have demonstrated that these diverse sources of genetic material complement each other very effectively to produce a substantial degree of hybrid vigor in the crossbred progeny.
