1959 WINTER SHOWS HAS RECORD ATTENDANCE

Nearly 16,000 people paid an admission charge to see the 1959 Red River Valley Winter Shows, Crookston, February 23-27. This looks like an all-time record high, according to B. E. Youngquist, president of the Winter Shows Board of Managers. The Show of 1951 had about 16,500 in paid attendance.

When one considers the attendance at the Winter Shows itself, along with the attendance at the various banquets, luncheons, conferences and educational meetings, the attendance totals 20,183 people. This does not include some of the smaller luncheon meetings. The Red River Valley Winter Shows continue to draw a large number of people who are interested in agriculture.

The Winter Shows Board of Managers, at their March 13 meeting, took formal action to abandon the present building site and to go ahead with plans to raise the necessary funds for locating a site and building a new set of buildings. It is possible that one more show will take place in the existing buildings. The new set of buildings will be ready by 1961.

LONG-TIME PLAN FOR DAIRY RESEARCH

Northwest Experiment Station

Dairy cattle cannot be justified at the Northwest Experiment Station, Crookston, unless they are utilized both in basic research problems and utilized to answer pertinent practical research problems; therefore, the primary objective of the long-time plan for the dairy facilities is to convert them into an efficient and productive experimental unit.

The conversion to an efficient experimental unit will involve: (1) increasing the size of the herd from 30 to 60 milking cows, (2) raising the butterfat production per cow per year from 370 to 500 pounds, (3) converting from pasture feeding in summer months to continuous dry lot feeding, and (4) expanding and remodeling dairy housing and feeding facilities.

Numbers are important in research as well as making efficient use of labor and equipment. The reliability of a research finding is directly related to the number of animals involved in the experiment. Labor and equipment costs per cow decrease as the number of animals increase. This, of course, is the main reason for the trend to larger dairy herds in the country.

Just an increase in cow numbers is not enough in a research herd or in a commercial herd. Production must also be increased in order to be an efficient experimental unit; therefore, definite plans are being made to increase the production per cow.

A continuous year-round dry lot feeding program has definite advantages in a research program. Why? It eliminates the effect of changing from barn feeding to pasture feeding. The feeding can be held more constant and therefore have a lesser influence on the experiment in progress. In order to facilitate year-round dry lot feeding, a portion of the cow yard will have to be paved.

In order to handle an increased number of dairy cattle, the dairy housing will be expanded and remodeled. The present dairy housing is inadequate; the stalls are too small for the cows. It is planned to remodel the present barn into a stanchion barn for the milking cows. A pole building addition is planned for the calves, young stock, and dry cows. Approximately 16 experimental feeding managers will be placed in the remodelled barn.

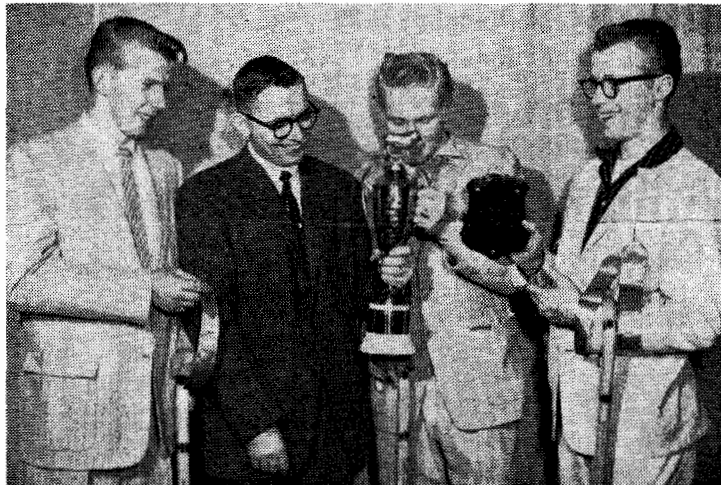
Philip Larson, residence hall proctor of Selvig Hall, served as adviser for the hobby show.

A start toward increasing the size and production of the dairy herd was realized in October, 1958, when 15 head of Registered Holstein females were transferred from the U. S. D. A. Research Center at Beltsville, Maryland, to the Crookston Experiment Station. The 15 head consisted of 2 cows and 13 heifers. All of the animals were sired by High Meadow Farm Masterpiece bull, Reg. No. 929962, and out of cows with outstanding production records.

These are plans. Planning comes ahead of progress. The realization of these plans will provide needed answers in basic research and some answers to practical research problems in the dairy industry.
